ON RE-INVENTING THE WHEEL - Editorial by WD4CQY



Elsewhere in this issue, there are articles by various Club officers pointing out common errors that they have noted, while performing their particular functions. With minor exceptions, these are the same errors that have cropped up since Day One of the Club. Let me give you a few of MY examples:

In the masthead of the last issue of the "Centurion" for which you have paid your subscription, there appears a red-inked notice that says "Your subscription expires with this issue. Please renew ." In the blank, I've written a date. That date has been chosen to allow me to make an educated guess on how many "Centurions" to have printed. About 25% of those subscribers receiving issues so I THINK I'LL CALL IT FIRE. stamped, get a renewal off to me in three or four weeks. Another 10% dribble in before, OR ON, the deadline. Another 10% come in still later - many after the issue

is already in the mail. Three or four months later, a handful of ex-subscribers will ask me, "What the hell, over!" About 50% of the expirees simply are never heard from, again. While this is very tough on your editor's fragile ego, it is understandable. Many of our members simply stay with us long enough to qualify for some particular award offerred by some other organization. Fair enough - that's one of the reasons we're here. But, those who have been spoon-fed an expiration notice, and then say, "What the hell, over!" irritate me.

On the pre-nets, and particularly the "Q and A" nets, I have heard the SAME questions asked

as many as FIVE TIMES, in a two-hour period. Amateur radio is intended to be a TWO-WAY system of communicating. That, of course, assumes that a receiver is being used on the same frequency as the transmitter. In the same vein, several nights ago, after having searched that portion of the 75 meter spectrum where the Club net normally meets in pre-net, I called "CQ Century Club" and with about 25 minutes to go until net time, I established contact with another Club member. Communications with him became impossible within about 5 minutes, due to "splatter". It turned out that another group of members had established their "pre-net" 500 Hz above us, and that evening's NCS had established a "pre-net" 400 Hz below us. NOW, COME ON, PEOPLE: WE ARE NO LONGER "ROCK-BOUND" - TWIRL YOUR VFOS BEFORE YOU TALK!!! (P.S., That same night, I worked two "6s" and a "Mobile 7", on the net, so I kinda believe I was "putting out".)

"Centurion" subscribers' call-signs, address, etc.: The "Centurion" subscriptions are filed by CALL-SIGN. Unless you have a very unique name like, say, "Mao Tse Tung" or "Joachim von Rust-Bucket", and you send the "Centurion" a renewal with YOUR NEW CALL-SIGN, and don't mark it as a renewal, as far as I'm concerned, YOU ARE A NEW SUBSCRIBER. And, while most subscribers meticulously keep me advised of their new addresses, there have been occasions where my address record has shown a subscriber wrong for ONE YEAR.

Now, these distribes are not intended to intimidate anyone, but, in a hobby with 2,000 volts often at our fingertips, I don't think that it is unreasonable to expect a tad bit more

I will "re-invent the wheel" as often as it seems necessary.

George recommended another printed form very suitable for use as a net log. It is the "Efficiency Data Filler Sheet", no. 636, available through your American Pad and Paper Co. distributor. It is 50 lines by 10 columns. George also pointed out that Club announcements are, by and large, non-existent, on the late nets. For example, he was asked if he were the "every-Saturday night NCS", before he knew that the net operated EVERY Saturday night.

NOTES FROM THE DESK OF THE AWARDS SECRETARY - "Who's on First" by WB3AMO Like the old Abbott and Costello routine about who's on first and what's on second, the questions continue to come in about what can be used

on the 1000-point award.

I'll take the prefix area first. You cannot use any CALL-SIGN, here, that you have used on either the 100 or 500 point awards. As an example, if you worked me twice, you cannot use one card for the 500 and the other for the 1000. However, if you used me as WB3AMO, on the 500, and worked me again, as "Portable 2", in NY, then you could use this second contact as a NY prefix, since WB3AMO and WB3AMO/2 are TWO DIFFERENT CALL-SIGNS. Anytime a station is portable or mobile, in a state other than his own, then

he becomes a different call-sign, for that state.

In the certificate holders' category, you may use CALL-SIGNS that you have used on previous awards. However, you could not use the SAME QSL CARD as used before; you must make another contact with that station. One point: You canNOT use a call-sign here that is also used in the prefix category. A CALL-SIGN may appear only once on the application.

(Editor's note: Please see the current Club By-Laws for the definition of a "call-sign") For the information of the members in the northeast, you can usually find me on ECARS on 7255 mHz, Saturdays, 9:30 - 10:30 AM, Eastern., if you have any questions.

THE 75/80 METER QSL BUREAU by KB3LR (as telephoned to WD4CQY)

There are several minor problems that I've noted during the short time I've been your 75/80

meter QSL Bureau Manager. Here are some of them:

POSTAGE. There are a few members who send in SAEs, without stamps. There are others who send me a gaggle of stamps, then send SAEs. I don't keep accounts, for each user. I can't do that and run the Bureau efficiently, too. There are those who send in 3½ x 6½" SASEs with up to \$1.00's worth of stamps on them. THERE IS NO WAY THAT I CAN "SHOE-HORN" 7 OZ. OF QSL CARDS INTO ONE LETTER-ENVELOPE. Plus, it might take me a year to collect that many. Please!, PLEASE!!, just send me 3 to 5 plain-vanilla SASEs, WITH YOUR NAME ON THEM (NOT MINE!), with your call-

sign in the upper, left corner, and with ONE or TWO first class units-worth of STAMPS on them.

DX POSTAGE POOL. Continuing the service established by my predecessors, I lay out quite a bit of postage in attempts to get your DX QSL cards. An extra buck for the pool, now and then,

would help to perpetuate this service. The "pool" is very nearly "dried up", just now.

UNCIAIMED CARDS. Normally, your cards will be sent out to you within two or three days of my receiving them, if you remain "good in the bureau". About once a quarter, I will "purge" the bureau, of unclaimed cards, and return them to the sender, again, IF YOU'RE GOOD IN THE BUREAU.

Otherwise, they will go to "file 13".

COMBOs. XYL/OMs, Dad/Sons, etc., please keep SASEs for BOTH call-signs at the bureau. If not, for Heaven's sake, send me a note saying whose SASE you want me to use.

I intend to be on the 75 meter pre-net, 2 or 3 nights a week, about a half hour before net time, and I hope to make every "Q & A Net". I'll be happy to answer any questions you may have, at those times. And, I'll welcome any suggestions you may have. Finally, and this is very important, IF YOU DON'T INTEND TO USE THE BUREAU, DON'T SAY THAT YOU WILL!!!

"CENTURION" SUBSCRIPTION POLICY by WD4CQY

New subscribers and "Dead File" renewals, UP UNTIL THE DAY I TAKE THE NEXT ISSUE TO THE PRINTER, will get a copy of the last issue "on the street", unless, as many have, they request otherwise. Once the "copy" has gone to the printer, your subscription will be entered with that new issue. Back issues, from Vol. I, No. 2 onward, will be provided, postpaid, for 50ϕ . Vol. I, No. 1 costs \$1, because I have to photo-copy my "morgue copy".

The "Centurion" is DESPERATELY trying to hold the annual postpaid subscription rate at \$2. Unfortunately, if your editor continues to be unable to obtain the Club documentation necessary to qualify for bulk-mail rates - documentation first requested in July, 1980 -, effective with the next issue, the price MUST go to \$3 per year. This one buck increase is partially due to increasing costs of printing (my printer has been doing the "Centurion" very nearly AT COST, from the outset); partially due to "new member packets" from the Club Secretary which say "\$2/year", which I expect will continue to dribble in, until at least next Christmas, and which I have to honor unless I want to spend even more postage to explain how come the price went up; but, PRIMARILY, due to current and projected first-class postage rates. This issue will cost MORE TO MAIL than TO PRINT.

Again, the "Centurion" is doing its best to hold the cost where it is, but, without a bulkmail permit, we've lost the war! (All extended subscriptions/renewals will be honored at the price obtaining as of the local postmarked date.)
