Subscriptions have expired, in the last six months, in each of those four "missing" states, as well as four other Canadian Provinces and four other foreign countries. Thus, it appears that the "Centurion's" brand of "fertilizer"



"WHERE DOES IT SAY THAT ... ?" by WA 2ZYM

For this column, let's see how the election process works

with the Century Club.

Under the Constitution, anyone may be an officer of the Century Club, provided that he: 1. be a 100 point certificate holder, 2. be nominated for the job by a 100 point certificate holder, and 3. be willing to be nominated, AND TO SERVE IF ELECTED.

At the present time, you have all heard the announcements about the upcoming elections. This year the directors from the odd-numbered call-areas will be elected (Ed. note including the DX Director,) as well as the President and Vice-

President. When the original Constitution was drafted, it was decided by the Board of Directors, and very wisely so, I think, that to maintain continuity of leadership, the directors would be elected on a staggered basis. This would prevent the situation which has been the demise of many groups, that is, a whole new slate of officers at the same time, with no ideas or guidance from previous administrations.

The method decided upon was to elect the directors from the even-numbered call-areas in the even years and the odd-numbered call-areas and DX directors, in the odd years, with a two-year term of office. This should give steady and continuous leadership. The newly elected director

has a year to, hopefully, learn the ropes under the guidance of seasoned directors.

The votes for director each year are to be mailed to the person designated by the Board, over a period of time starting in November, and ending approximately one week before the Presidential election. Of course, you can only vote for a director from your call-area (if you are one of those individuals who has a 2 call in 9-land, through the wisdom of the FCC, then make sure you note yourself as "/9", when voting for the 9th area director.)

The Presidential Election was set up to run on the air - something which is still unique to the Century Club. People are nominated by the Board, in October and November Board meetings, and also, by the individual member through his area director. If you do not get your nomination to your area director in time for the November Board meeting, then it is too late. The nominee who receives the highest number of votes shall be declared President; the nominee with the second highest number of votes shall become Vice-President. Both shall serve for one-year terms.

The Century Club has over a thousand members, at the present time. There is no reason why a majority of those cannot take a few minutes, on election night, to fire up the rig and vote. Some members have complained about the lack of a secret ballot, for President, and will not vote because of this. The open method was picked for a number of reasons, but primarily because, with this system, there is absolutely no way that anyone can claim that they were cheated! Also,

votes are not only immediately counted, but are done so by upwards of 100 people!

This closing comment on elections must be in the form of what might be called an editorial. It seems to us that, while there are no service requirements for any office in the Club, that the especially, charged as he is by the Constitution and By-Laws to oversee the operations of the Club, should be elected from among those members with a background of service to the Club, in other capacities: Former, or current - Awards managers, Area Directors, Secretaries, NCS Coordinators, etc., would be good choices, since those positions require a person to be thoroughly familiar with the Club. It IS POSSIBLE to be elected President TWO WEEKS AFTER BECOMING A MEMBER, but if that happened, we think the common sense of many voters would have to be questioned.

That about covers it for now. The dates of the various elections and the candidates are listed elsewhere in this issue. Read them over, make a choice and, FOR PETE'S SAKE, VOTE!!!!!!!

NOTES FROM THE DESK OF THE AWARDS SECRETARY by WB3AMO Call Area Award

One of the awards the Club offers, that some of you may not be aware of, is the Call Area Award. This award requires 25 contacts each from 80 and 40 meters. A total of 50 contacts, with a minimum of 5 with each state in the particular call area, is the requirement. On this award, you may use KH6s and KL7s toward the 6th and 7th call areas, respectively. No call may appear more than once. For example, N5CJA/4 NC and N5CJA/4 GA, etc., would be considered the same call. Cards from previous awards may be reused for this one.

The award fee is \$4.00 for its initial issuance. Endorsements (20 possible) will be issued free, for each additional call area.

the upper left of the masthead of this issue for details on subscription rates.)

I find it necessary to print this distinction for a couple of reasons. First, a handful of subscription/renewal checks come in with "dues" written on the "for" or "memo" line. Secondly, I have one pair of subscribers with the same surname and same address that continue to renew BOTH subscriptions.

The Century Club has no dues - only fees; the "Centurion" has no dues nor fees - only

subscriptions.

CALIBRATE YOUR SPEEDOMETER? by WD4CQY

On the Interstate highways, where there are mile markers, you can easily calibrate your automobile speedometer using either: 3600 = MPH , or: 55 45 40 30 MPH 65.5 80 90 120 secs. mile secs. for 1 mi.

I would like to thank George, WB3IZK, for his work as the 75 meter QSL Bureau Manager for the period that he operated it. George did a great job. I just hope I can do as well, during the time I operate it.

Now, I would like to mention some, hopefully, helpful hints and suggestions that I think will help me to operate the bureau in the most efficient and expeditious manner, and at the same

time keep all of the users of the bureau happy.

First, let's talk about SASEs and postage. I see a lot of waste due to the amount of postage on the SASEs, and the make and sizes of the envelopes. First class postage is 20ϕ , 37ϕ and 54ϕ for one, two and three ounces, respectively. Envelopes range in size from $3\frac{1}{2}$ " X $6\frac{1}{2}$ " to $6\frac{1}{2}$ " X $9\frac{1}{2}$ ", and most of the odd-size envelopes are made of a heavy substance, which adds weight. Instead of getting 6 to 8 cards in the envelope for 20ϕ , I can only get maybe 5 cards in them. I realize that most stations do not like to receive folded cards, so they use these odd-size envelopes, however 99% of the cards going through the bureau will fit in a normal 4" X $9\frac{1}{2}$ " business size envelope without being folded, and these envelopes are about as light in weight as you can use. Based on these findings, I suggest that everyone use the 4" X $9\frac{1}{2}$ " envelopes, with 20ϕ or 37ϕ postage on them. I would suggest 20ϕ postage if you wish to receive cards quickly. If you are in no hurry, put 37ϕ on your SASEs. This will take care of about fifteen cards.

Secondly, please keep at least 3 SASEs on file in the bureau, with all the calls you have held in the last three years, in the upper lefthand corner, to include your YL's/OM's calls. There are some cases where we do not know what calls are combos. Please insure you have put postage on your SASE. Don't send loose stamps, money, money orders or checks. The reasons for this is twofold. Number one, these items can be lost, and number two, it is easier for the user to get the stamps and put them on his own envelopes, than for me to have to do it for a dozen or so different people. It takes time to do this, and at present, I average one to three hours a day sorting cards, stuffing envelopes and getting envelopes ready for mailing. All I am asking

for is a little help, please.

Thirdly, please make sure your cards are legible. For example, I have had some cases where I could not tell whether the call on the card had a U or a V in it. I also would like to ask that if you work a station and that station says "QSL through the bureau via -----", please note this somewhere on the card. Also, if QSLing a combo, write "in combo with ---", please.

Fourth, I would like to ask the QSL bureau users, who feel we should take care of the postage for mailing cards to the DX stations, to just send me an extra stamp, from time to time, so I can build up a small postage fund for DX cards. The DX stations are pretty good about mailing their cards to us, but it is difficult for them to furnish SASEs to the bureau. Some of the Century Club members have done this already, and have also sent donations, which we have put toward this fund. I want to thank these people very much for their thoughtfulness.

My last item is the following list of stations that have QSL cards at the bureau without SASEs. I wish all readers of this article would let these people know about their cards if you have them on if you must have an interest them on the sime. This list was comment as of Ontohan # 1982:

"BREAK-BREAK" an Editorial by WD4CQY

On Friday, November 5th, my minister died of a massive heart attack. He and his wife were entering the church office. She immediately phoned the fire department paramedics, who responded quickly. Unfortunately, this small Florida city had decided to put the fire department on the same commercial radio channel as was assigned to the city's several other utilities services (rather than the police department) (See below.)

The paramedic with his HH tried several times to break a conversation between the utility people and their workers the latter of whom were trying to find a sewer leak! There is no evidence that he ever transmitted "break-break", or "emergency", etc. - or for that matter, whether the utility department people would ve even RECOGNIZED such a transmission. For this reason, the paramedic was unable to get through to his dispatcher to request an ambulance and higher level medical assistance.

It seems to me that our emergency services - police, fire, ambulance and, where applicable, marine patrol - should have AT LEAST ONE COMMON CHANNEL, but, I'm given to understand that there is an FCC regulation PROHIBITING ANYONE (PRESUMABLY INCLUDING THE PRESIDENT OF THE U.S.) FROM TRANSMITTING ON ANY POLICE-ASSIGNED FREQUENCY. I've tried to "wring this out", locally, without too much success; so, if any "Centurion" reader has any further information, please let me know.

Alternatively, it seems to me that, with the taxes all of us are paying, it's not too much to ask for our emergency services to instal mobile CB radios with a Channel 9 capability, as a back-up.

Further, it seems that we should instruct our emergency services personnel on how to DEMAND THE ONLY FREQUENCY THEY MAY HAVE AVAILABLE.

This brings me to the point of this diatribe. As most of you well know, whether I'm QNC or just QNI, on our nets, when I hear a MULTIPLE BREAK ("break-break", or the more common "breakbreak-break-break-break-break"), you're gonna hear me stop the net AND ASK THE NATURE OF YOUR EMERGENCY.

It turns out that most "break-breaks" are "crying wolf"; but, for heaven's sake, PLEASE CONTINUE TO TREAT EVERY DOUBLE BREAK AS AN EMERGENCY! (AND, DON'T SAY "BREAK-BREAK", UNLESS YOU REALLY MEAN IT.)

Having flown airplanes, off and on, for some 34 years, I've never found it necessary to say "MAYDAY"; but, by God, if I have to say "MAYDAY", tomorrow, YOU'D DAMN WELL BETTER RESPOND, or I'll make sure that Saint Peter takes you off his list!
