Fart I of this editorial appeared in the "Centurion", VCL II. No. 3 (March, 1981), wherein I stated that I would "re-invent the whell", as often as it seemed necessary.

Without regard to the order of importance, here are some of the things that I have noted, in the interim, that have caused some degree of grief to me, both as the "Centurion" editor and as a "plain vanilla" member of the 3905 Century Club:

QSL cards - About 4% of the QSL cards I receive have Z time and
LCCAL DATE (ocassionally, vice versa). Now, unless specifically
requested otherwise, ALL QSLs for QSOs completed below 144 MHz should
show both Z time AND Z date. This is customary throughout the amateur
world. Also, every now and then, I get a QSL with different call-signs

for me, in the information portion as compared to the address portion. And, occasionally, I'll get one with a different signal report than that which I QSLed on the nets. I believe the Z time mistakes probably are the results of ignorance; so, it is up to all of us to TEACH the lady or gent, in a friendly manner. The other mistakes, though, must be due to plain carelessness - and carelessness, when you have 2,000 volts, or more, within inches of your hands, CAN BE DEADLY.

"Let George Do It" - Recently I received a piece of correspondence that included this phrase: "I use the C.C. often." (my underline). Perhaps the member simply made a poor choice of words, and really meant to say, "I participate in the C.C. often." Nevertheless, it started me thinking and observing just how many members "use" the Club and how few "participate". If you like, check yor dictionary for the differences implied - "use" is a one-way transaction; "participate" is two-way. There is quite a difference as they apply to the general welfare of the Club. One good example is simply stated - "No NCS, no net!"

Input to the "Centurion" - The Club's President, Vice-President and Awards Secretary almost always send in articles for the "Centurion"; virtually NCBODY ELSE does, anymore. No member can be QNI on both 40 m. and 75 m. nets, seven nights a week, fifty-two weeks a year. I am no exception. If I don't hear it = I don't know it = I CAN'T PRINT IT! Over the life of the "Centurion", I've collected, on various scraps of paper, several tid bits of (I hope) interest or humor. I keep them to use as "fillers". But, with the dearth of subscriber input, of late, about 25% of the "Centurion" is now "filler" - that's fair to neither you nor me. In the past, the "Centurion" has had subscriber-submitted antenna articles, suggested log sheet designs, a 6-land survey of strong-signal East Coast stations and numerous other items of interest, including pieces by two different members who had visited BY-land. Of late, NOTHING. Surely, you have had something interesting happen to you, in amateur radio, of late. If not, why are you still hamming? Share it with us. Maybe you had an unique Field Day experience this year. Did you grab a rare DX station? How about a super long-distance 2m. or 70 cm. QSO? I can't promise to print everything you send me, but I sure would like to have more to choose from than what I have now, which is nothing!

"Centurion" subscriptions and renewals - For reasons unknown to me, the subscription/renewal checks from about 5% of the subscribers come in made out to either the 3905 Century Club or to the "Centurion", rather than to "Tom Bowers". One reader subscribed and has renewed TWICE that way. All announcements, of every kind, have always said "make checks payable to 'Tom Bowers'", and, I've included notes in outgoing "Centurions" saying the same thing. I really don't know what else I can do to get your attention. Fortunately, my bank has one teller who understands the problem. Then there are those who "forget" to renew, and as I write this, there are SIXTY-EIGHT of them whose subscriptions expired with the last issue. There is a red stamp, in the mast-head of your last paid issue, that states the renewal date. If red ink, on a black and white page, can't get your attention, I'm at a loss asto what else I could do. Late renewals - those that are received after the next issue has gone to the printer - are handled as new subscribers. This is because both the Club's President and Secretary have lists of subscribers' line numbers and call-signs, and when the "Centurion" goes to press, I prepare an "add and delete" report for each of them.

Rebuttals - Rebuttals to this editorial are most certainly invited; I sure would appreciate some letter-mail, occasionally, to go with all the junk-mail that is about all I get, anymore!

In the last thirty days, or so, I've noted three times when apparently NCBODY stepped forward. Results -NO-NET-

If you decide to become a regular or alternate "matchmaker", contact the Net Control Coordinators - KiDUG (40 meters) and WB9QEZ (75 meters).

"WHERE DOES IT SAY THAT ... ?" by WA2ZYM

Having just returned from a rather lengthy trip around the U.S., I would like to devote this issue's column to working mobiles.



First, let us define a mobile station according to the By-Laws: A station is considered to be a mobile when it is mounted in, or on, some form of vehicle (Editor's note: The dictionary definition of "vehicle" would include such conveyances as horses, hang-gliders, skate-boards and even stilts), AND, is powered by a source independent of commercial electrical supply. It may be land-, air- or water-based. No station may be used more than once, IN THE SAME STATE, as a

mobile. It may be used more than once, in the mobile category (or any other) when the QSL card

CLEARLY shows the mobile to have been in a different state, on each contact claimed.

Not too hard, is it? Just remember that you can claim a station, as a mobile, as many times as you have cards for, AS LONG AS EACH ONE IS FOR A DIFFERENT STATE. If you want to use

a mobile as a prefix in a state, go to it. It's CK.

Now, how can you best use mobiles, and how can you help them? Well, one thing that is a big help is to aid them in getting checked into the net. If you are a base station, and you hear a mobile trying to check in, EVEN IF IT IS HIS FIRST TRY AT IT, for Pete's sake, tell the NCS that the mobile is there. Mobile signals are notoriously poor compared to base stations. Help the mobile out.

Next, in calling a mobile, don't give up on the first try. Many mobiles are in motion, while on the air, and may not, due to traffic, hear your first call, even though you are 59. Have YOU ever tried to listen to the net through QRM, QRN, two kids yelling and a tractor-trailor going by you at 70 MPH? It ain't easy!

When you go to QSL the mobile, please put BOTH signal reports on the card. Again, if the

mobile is in motion, he may not be able to log the call. If you really want the card, it only makes sense to do everything you can to see that you get it. Putting down both reports is a help. It also helps if you put down the state that the mobile was in. Think about it. just returned from a trip in which I worked some people in nine different states. Not all the calls got logged. If you send me a card marked "mobile  $\emptyset$ ", was I in MN, SD or where, when we made the contact? Every little bit helps.

The last thing you can do has nothing to do with the actual contact, but rather the QSL from the mobile to you. Give the person time to write them. You cannot expect to get a card until the person is at least back at the home QTH. Even then, it takes time. My last trip was 30 days long, covered ten states, and, between the Century Club and other operations, I arrived home having to 1) get ready for my son's wedding; 2) catch up on the mail and bills; 3) put a new roof on the house, and 4) write and send out approximately 300 QSL cards!! You figure out the order of importance.

I hope that the above will help you to make the best use of mobile contacts. Having operated mobile in 32 states, I know that these practices will make it much easier on the mobile station to make contact with you, and to confirm that contact. Good luck, and I'll see you, from the mobile.
