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Election 2004

As happens every year about this time, our club is in the middle of our annual elections for club officers.

This year we are electing Area Directors in the even numbered call areas along with elections for President and Vice President.

One change to the election cycle in 2004 resulted from a change to the Bylaws made by the Board of Directors this fall.

Beginning with the 2004 election year the term of office for President is two years.

With the 2005 year elections, the Vice President election will also be for a two year term, with the elections for President and Vice President in subsequent years being for two year terms.

Candidates for President this year include Steve Wonders—KD8QQ; Dave Smith—WQ1H; and Bill Martin—WM4SG.

The Vice President candidates are Robin Stout— KE3NR and Ron Stanley— NC4RS.

In the Second Call Area, Peter Summers is running for reelection unopposed as Area Director.

The Fourth Call Area has two candidates this year with Robert Duckworth—KE4DYG and Bob Wilder—AF2HD running.

Loren Hunt—AD6ZJ is running unopposed for the Sixth Call Area.

In the Eighth Call Area there are three candidates running including Earl Hubbard—WY8V; Larry Ashton—N2OCW; and John Bransford—KV8O.

The Tenth Area also has a contested election with two candidates. Running for that office are Frank Taylor—AAØZP and Jay Wieland—NØPUI.

Voting for Area Directors is by mail only, either snail mail or email. All ballots must be received by the election monitor no later than 0001 UTC on January 15th, 2004.

The election monitor for the Area Director elections is Bill Martin—WM4SG.

Ballots for President and Vice President can also be sent to the election monitor via email or U.S. Mail and also must be received no later than January 15th.

Votes for President and Vice President may also be cast during the annual onthe-air election held during our regular scheduled net times on January 30th, 2004.

Voting will commence at 0000 UTC on the evening of calendar 30th on 40 meters and will continue on 75 meters at 0200.

The elections will be conducted by AAØZP and results of all elections will be announced before the conclusion of the nets.



The Ideal Mobile Installation by Tom—AA1NZ

I think I have finally found a mobile installation that I'm nearly satisfied with. I started mobiling around 1966, but it's only been in the last 7 or 8 years that I started to seriously consider making an installation work better rather than just work.

Since my work with selling and servicing electric motors and controls has me on the road almost daily, I have plenty of time to ham while driving to and from service calls. My travels take me all over New England and into a couple of surrounding states.



The rig is an Icom 706 MK 2a. My favorite key is an old brown base Vibroplex paddle set driving an MFJ-401 Econo-keyer. I use the external keyer (rather than the Icom's built-in) since it's easier to run by "feel" while driving or operating in the dark.

Recently, I found a super-duper miniature paddle set with built in memory keyer, and it's a dream to operate. It's called the Palm Mini-Paddle keyer (http://www.morsex.com).



I also carry a spare straight key by Hamkey for emergency use. I guess you have by now surmised I like mobile CW.

I do operate SSB at times, but usually have to search around for my mic for a while---I know it's in there somewhere



I have several different antennas I use depending on the conditions of the trip I'm taking. Since I found Charlie Gyenes Giant Quick disconnect (http://www.hiqantennas.com) I can have antennas swapped and stowed in less than a minute. My basic arsenal consists of: Hi-Q 2.5/40 MT for 40-10; Hi-Q 4/80 MT for 80-10; Hamsticks for 40 and 20; and modified Hustlers for 40, 20, and 15. My real "attention getter" is the 32 foot military vertical I use for 40m. Absolutely mobile, but certainly not street legal.



This installation has to be about the "quietest" mobile installation I have ever heard. Besides using all of the standard grounding/bonding tricks, I think these things have helped, too:

antenna as far from engine as possible--rig away from vehicle electronics (under rear seat)--The V-8 engine has a coil and very, very short plug wire for each cylinder--antenna feedpoint up and away from ground--power feed run in shielded conduit--all coax out and away from vehicle electronics-good match at feedpoint.



Another little touch is the Radio Shack Walkman CD to Tape Player adapter.

I use this gadget to feed the rig's audio into the truck stereo system, and have 4-way surround sound. Really helps to boost those weak signals.

Finishing off the setup is a mobile color picture QSL card. It seems many people enjoy the novelty of working a mobile CW station, and everyone likes pictures.

Many ask how is it possible to drive and send code. The answer--- Lots of coffee!!"

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We Were All Young Once


Recently I asked, via the email group, for any pictures of our members in their younger days.

Below is a more recent picture of Kevin. Kevin is our club's Public Relations Officer and resides in Colorado.





Ed Note: The 75 Meter Bureau also handles cards for 160 meters, all CW nets, RTTY Nets and PSK Nets.

From November 1, 2002 through November 1, 2003, the bureau has handled the following volume of cards.

Incoming Cards 16,478 oz— 1,029.8 pounds.

Outgoing Cards 13,489 oz— 843.0 pounds.

For a total of 29.967 oz—1,872.8 pounds.

There are 1365 people using the bureau. Largest being the 4th call area with 350.

So far to date I have had 832 orders for my "POSTAL PLAN" placed by members.

Year-End Report from 40 Meter Early Net by K9TWV

The 40 meter early net had a good summer, up to 100 plus check ins most nights, and with less than perfect band conditions.

I have implemented the use of split NCS, hopefully to stop or slow down the burnout, as the NCS only has a two hour net.

Too Many Nets? Or Not Enough? An Invitation for Discussion.

When the Century Club was first established we operated on one band with one net each night—75 meters on 3.905 MHz.

An expansion to our operation occurred when we added an additional 40 Meter SSB Net to the mix.

Since those early dates we have seen our nets expand to where today we have nets on 5 bands and we operate in four modes-SSB, CW, RTTY and PSK-31.

Instead of only 14 nets each week on 75 and 40 meters, in SSB mode, we now operate 60 nets each week with an occasional special late-late net thrown in for good measure.

That translates into 3,120 nets during the course of a year. That's a long way from the original 365 nets a year when the club first started.

While we operate on five bands (17-20-40-80-160), no awards are offered for contacts made on the informal nets operating on 17 meters.

During 2003 we added two new nets to our operations with expansion of the CW nets into 20 and 160 meters. Whoever thought CW was dead hasn't visited the 3905 Century Club lately.

Now for the discussion invitation. Some members feel that we have too many nets today and that causes a lack of participation on some of our core nets, such as 75 meter SSB.

Others feel that we ought to expand our nets into the higher bands, such as 10 meters, and include other modes such as SSTV.

The goal of the Century Club has been to have "something for everyone" which we can see with the checkins for some nets-in other words, some people ONLY check into CW and others prefer CW.

So, what is YOUR view or opinion? Send your thoughts to the editor and we'll include them in the next issue.
