Antenna Shoot Out

A Different Outcome!

Report From The

The Eighth Annual 3905 Century Club Mobile Antenna Shoot Out

was held on 30 JULY, 2009 at the Vista Antique and Steam Engine Museum in Vista, Ca. Quite a few new faces joined us this year and we had a good turn out with 14 contestants. The mixture of recorded scores were spread over quite a range, but the winning scores were reasonably close together. Many of the participants are beginning to understand how we test our antennas and what is required of their systems in order to place in the top slots.

The Results are posted in the order of highest score first. Type of antenna, type of vehicle, and mount location are also included in the chart for comparison of "systems". Please be sure to read the comments which follow the published results as there has been considerable controversy surrounding the shootout this year.

Gloom, Despair, and Agony on me.... That old song rings so true this year. I had expected to attend and conduct the shootout this year, but three last minute service calls at work prevented that.

So, I shipped the test gear to Loren with only days to spare. He put the shootout in the hands of two very shootout savvy individuals – K0WJ, Lon and NJ9T, Prez Pete. However, in all the confusion, I neglected to post the usual and customary set of procedures and rules which would normally preclude our annual event. This later proved to be disastrous for one contestant (Lon, K0WJ) when he failed to remember our cap hat size rule that would normally be enforced. When this was pointed out after the contest, Lon (being the honest person I have always know him to be) voluntarily disqualified himself from competition. This also meant forfeiting his first place finish, the "Top Gun" cap, and the first prize of a new Hi-Q Antenna (which he has since shipped to the second place finisher who was declared the winner upon Lon's withdrawal).

So what have we learned Most of the controversy clouding this year's event had to do with what I feel is lack of technical knowledge of how a mobile antenna system really works. Our little group of "antenna kickers" has been enjoying visiting with one another each year at the shootouts and having fun in the sun. We have also been learning from one another about which antenna set-ups work and which ones work better. Many have observed firsthand that even a marginal antenna (when mounted properly) can outperform a superior antenna (that has been mounted poorly).

One of the major complainants.... this year insisted that the test equipment could not have been working properly. I offered to let him pick up and try the gear for himself (and even Loren offered to deliver it), but he declined. After the gear was returned to me, I took it out in the field and tested it to insure it was working properly – it was. If anyone is interested, I have pix and results from testing three different brands of antennas from one vehicle and one mount location.

Now the hard part.....I sincerely regret the grief my inattention has caused the club, our club president, and especially my friend Lon. And, I am ashamed of and personally embarrassed by the behavior of one of the shootout participants that I specifically encouraged and invited to attend. For these reasons, I wish to offer an apology to all for this inattention on my part and desire to remove myself as "Shootout Master". Hopefully some "new blood" will keep the spirit and excitement of our shootouts going for many years to come.





Not a safe place to operate from, so use the Old Marker. You are still close enough to the actual tristate to count it as good. Remember Safety FIRST!



This just in



Prior to getting my Amateur ticket in the spring of 1981, I was, like many ops, a CB'er. I had a brand new President Washington base radio and a Wilson Laser 6 element Beam Antenna. Through a sheer accident from simply fooling around with the buttons on the rig, I found it rather curious when I pushed the "priority channel 9" button half-way in, the digital frequency readout would disappear, yet I could hear people talking "out there, where ever "there" was.

So, I rigged up a little jig, that allowed the button to be pushed in half-way and held there, and one fateful day, I keyed the microphone and called out if anybody could hear me. A fellow in Milano Italy came back to me and said I was 5 over 9. I could hardly believe my ears, but as a result of that first contact, I was "hooked" on making contacts to other stations out there, where ever "there" was.

I subsequently made over 30 DX contacts and collected "State flag Post Cards" (all the rage back then) of all 50 states. One late summer evening, I was enjoying a pleasant qso with a young lady named Michelle, located in Fairbanks Alaska,

when there came a knock on the front door. It was "Uncle Charlie", from the F.C.C., who just happened to be in town, checking out complaints regarding illegal CB activity in the area.

I was informed that they had monitored me operating on an unauthorized frequency, transmitting longer that 10 minutes without identifying my station call-letters, and communicating with a station more that 250 miles away....(the limit for Citizen Band, contacts). I pled guilty to everything but the operating on an illegal frequency part of their complaint.

It was then that I learned where "there" was, when they informed me I was transmitting on 27.445mHz....channel "44" in CB lingo. They accused me of having a modified transmitter, which I vehemently denied, saying I bought it brand new from Comtron Electronics in town and it has not had any adjustments or modifications done to it.

When I showed them my little trick with the Channel 9 priority button, and because the rig had an FCC approved tag on the back, they elected not to confiscate it,

however advised me that if I really wanted to talk DX like I was doing, I should go apply for a ham radio license.

I did, and within a month, got my novice ticket, informed the F.C.C. of my actions and received a letter in the mail a few days later telling me that due to my cooperation and becoming a licensed amateur operator, they were dropping all further proceedings against me. A number of other operators in town were not so fortunate, having incurred substantial monetary fines as well as having their equipment confiscated.

Three months later I upgraded to Advanced and now we jump to the summer of '81, when I made my very first Century Club contact with a station in Louisiana, when the club was actually *on* 3.905mHz. This was back when I also had a contact with a fellow I now refer to as the Voice of America, whom y'all know as W5NNO, *before* he had his 40 and 75m 100 pt awards.

I may not be as old as some members of the Century Club, but I do go back a 'few' years as I kicked around the nets for a good while...even was an NCS on occasion in the mid 1980's.....but never considered the idea of applying for any of the awards the club offered..not even the 100 pointer one.

When I expanded my business in '91, which left little time for such luxuries as Ham Radio, I became much inactive until I sold the business, retired, and dusted off what is now considered an "antique" Kenwood TS830S; replaced all the coaxes and rotor control cables on the tower, (squirrels had stripped much of the insulation off over the years), and keyed the old straight key for the first time in nearly 17 years and was surprised to see the watt meter show I was "getting out".

That was in the fall of 2007. The "Dragon" was back on the air again! Initially, the Dragon handle was the result of my drag-racing days where I had the name Magik Draggin painted on the side of my ram-inducted Dodge Dart. Nowadays, the moniker has been modified to Dragon's Breath in honor of my pet and faithful companion, a big stray Tomcat I adopted from the animal shelter, who shares the shack with me. He has *got* to have the foulest breath.....hence the name of the Club.

One of the first things I did after getting back on the air, was to hunt down one of the Century Club nets and check in.

It was all uphill from there, as it was then I decided to do something with all those cards I had collected from past years...

and I actively began in earnest in going after some of the Century Club awards.

The rest is "history" now. Believe me, I can certainly appreciate those who obtained their Masters Awards long before me...before the benefits of some technological aids that we have today. What those early Masters accomplished was a sheer stupendous and absolutely awesome achievement!

And while I may have had the benefit of some of the advances in licensing, sophisticated buro operations, and easily obtainable "vanity calls", by no stretch of ones imagination, could it be said that all that made becoming a Master, EASY.

Eas*IER* maybe, to some degree, but no means was it EASY! I almost quit and gave up on a number of occasions, thinking this is just plain 'impossible' to do....but with a lot of encouragement from a lot of helpful and concerned Club members, I stuck with it, until one day while sorting through the literal PILE of cards I had, pieces of that Poker Player award suddenly started falling into place.

I can't say enough and dole out enough praise to each and every individual who helped make becoming Master Number 50 a reality for me, and it would be virtually impossible to attempt to list them here....and if I did try, knowing me, I'd end up leaving someone out.

Suffice it to say, it was a "club effort"...I couldn't have and didn't do this alone and all by myself. If you fellow club members had not participated in the nets, I would probably STILL be out there scraping and scratching for cards to do the 1k awards.

Thank you, one and all. I am proud to be included in with the ranks of the Masters who have come before me, and I will look forward in welcoming those Masters who will come after me as you have welcomed me. And thank you ALL for helping make this a very special day for me.

After all these years, *FINALLY*...I am a "Master" at something, heh heh.

Volunteering

Theme: "Volunteers improve our club."

Volunteering is many times misunderstood. Many people who volunteer do not consider that this is what they are doing. They think what they are doing is just part of being helpful or being a good member but it goes much beyond that.

The most visible volunteers to many may be our club officers, net control stations, net coordinators and our awards processors. But we have members, many of which are much less visible in our club that performs many duties to enhance this club and to keep it going. We have committees that review documents, assist the board of directors in researching decisions and help us to keep a watch on the organization. We have tutors and mentors that step in to help a new NCS get started. Many of these same mentors may help a "first timer" on the net by explaining our protocol while on the net. We have stations that provide much needed relay help when the bands are in bad shape. There are many ways of volunteering other than holding an office.

Every aspect of this organization exists because of volunteers. We are all volunteers and our pay is the enjoyment we receive from doing more than just participating in a net. Some of our officers are rarely heard on the nets but they do an important job in keeping this club alive. Would we like for them to check in? You bet! But we all understand that making time to check into a long running net can take hours away from your family. Imagine how much time our net control stations spend on the nets. Some stations are there for one round, some for two or more; NCS is there for the duration of the net.

If you look at an object from a distance, it may look smooth, almost glassy. But, if you put it under a microscope, you will see that the object is really not smooth at all, but has lots of jagged, sometimes sharp, edges and holes, dents or voids. The same applies in our organization. To you and me a net might not seem to run as smooth as we would like for it to, but to those that are listening in, the net may appear to be running as smooth as glass. We have our volunteers to thank for our appearance.

I would like to challenge all of our members to find a way to be helpful to our club. Find something you are comfortable in doing, and in your own way volunteer. Statistics show that we have around 600 members active on our nets at any one time during the year. We have just over 1900 nets per year. This year we have had 69 stations receiving credit for net control on these nets. The thanks that you give your NCS during and after the nets are very much appreciated. What can you do as an active participant? Something as simple as being ready for your call when your turn comes up can make our nets run more smoothly. Providing relay help when ask, or when no one else steps up for a station that is having trouble can cut time spent trying to complete a call.

So what are you waiting on? Volunteer today. If you have tried to volunteer in the past, but didn't get a response, try again. Don't give up, keep trying. There are times that a

particular task may not need additional resources, and other times that we do. Next month may be different than the last and we don't keep a list of wanna-be helpers, although I suppose we should.



Tower Down in 30 minutes

I needed this tower down and after a number of trips to the top I decided that at my age and in my health situation there had to be another way than the old gen pole approach . This tower is a Rohn 45 and is (or was) 86 feet in the air . I had already taken down the tri bander and the verticals all that was left was a 17 element 2 meter antenna .

I have a friend that happens to have an electric company and big boom trucks. I remember seeing him setting very large light poles with ease and thought maybe if he could hook to my tower a little above the middle to find a balance point then he could lower it to the ground and after talking to him his said no problem. Well he still charged me \$100 bucks an hour but hey that's his thing! Actually he was only there a little over half an hour so it cost me \$50.00. I had the guide line down and the bolts out from the bottom section. Another great thing is when a big boom truck pulls up in your neighborhood all the guys that live around you come out to help, they can't help it!

This worked out really well and I highly recommend this for a quick take down .
