I had been experiencing slight vertigo for the past few weeks but driving seemed solid. I pulled into the WV rest area and got out of the car to use the facilities. I started walking backwards with no control over it. In retrospect, it probably would have been a good idea to make a u-turn and go home. After using the rest area, my car would not shift out of park (broken shift cable). A \$65 tow along with a couple hundred dollar repair bill got the car shifting again. Have you ever spent two days in a crappy motel in Hagerstown Maryland waiting for your car? I did. The rest of the trip was relatively uneventful, (other than the torrential rains on route 40 crossing Tennessee) and I arrived at the eyeball on Friday, July 19th - none the worse for wear.

I had a great time visiting with everyone and of course, the highlights for me was presenting the Presidential Awards on Saturday night. As always, the eyeballs end too soon and I struck out for New York on Sunday morning. The trip back was uneventful, still driving OK but getting more unstable on my feet. I arrived home late on Monday afternoon and was totally exhausted. The vertigo had progressed where I was having trouble walking. On Tuesday, a friend stopped and saw the poor condition I was in and convinced me to go to the emergency room. I was admitted and spend the next two weeks in the hospital culminating with surgery on July 2nd



to remove a tumor that was pressing against my brain. Recovery went well and I was discharged from the hospital the following week.

Recovery has been slow (as expected) and the hospital found a few other problems I was unaware of. (High blood pressure and diabetes). Everything's going good, I've never felt better in my life and I'm on a regimen of radiation, chemo and a plethora of pills. I guess the alternative is much worse. :)

I would be very remiss if I didn't mention the outpouring of support from the Century Club members. So many of you sent cards and email greetings - it's somewhat overwhelming. I can say, without reservation, there is NO finer group in Ham Radio than the Century Club. I'm honored to be a member of this group. I'd also like to extend a special thanks to Dean, N7XG. Dean has been in constant contact with me throughout this ordeal and he has been a true friend. Thank you Dean.

Pope Francis visits the United States September 22 – 27 and amateur radio will be part of the celebration. Throughout the 6 day event (**September 23 0000Z** – **September 28 0000Z**) 6 special event amateur radio stations will be on the air to commemorate the event. Call signs from the Washington, DC area will be K3P air to commemorate the event. This year with the World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia and the second time a Pope has visited Philadelphia, Ron Sigismonti, says having several special event stations on the air by members of a club that originated in Philadelphia, then expanded to encompass the

The Washington, DC operations are being coordinated by the Jim Nitzberg, WX3B of the Potomac Valley Radio Club (pvrc.org). The southeastern Pennsylvania and New Jersey operations are under the direction of Ron Sigismonti, N3RS of the Frankford Radio Club (gofrc.org). The New York activity is being coordinated by John Melfi, W2HCB of the Great South Bay Amateur Radio Club (gsbarc.org). W3P efforts on the air are being coordinated by Joe Leone, KA3LKM (qrz.com/db/w3p). WM3PEN operations are being coordinated by Bob Josuweit, WA3PZO, and the Holmesburg Amateur Radio Club (harcnet.org).

We are privileged to be able to represent our region of the USA via Amateur Radio. Every three years there is a World Meeting of Families. In 2012 amateur radio operators in Italy had the call II2POPE on the air. This year amateur radio operators in 5 states will be on the make this a special event. Additionally, operations from the Greater Washington, D.C. metropolitan area, metropolitan New York City, and parts of New Jersey will encompass the entire region visited by Pope Francis in the United States. It will allow those who can't be in the various cities that he is visiting to participate in this event by talking to those who are. In essence this will be a world family meeting of amateur radio operators.

The Pope arrives at Joint Base Andrews on September 22 and begins his visit in Washington, D.C. with a meeting with President Obama on Wednesday, September 23. He delivers a speech to a joint session of Congress on Thursday, September 24. On Friday he attends a meeting of the United Nations General Assembly in New York and participates in a multireligious service at the 9/11 Memorial and Museum at the World Trade Center. On Saturday he gives a speech at Independence Hall in Philadelphia and concludes his visit to the U.S. with an outdoor mass in front of the Philadelphia Museum of Art on Sunday, September 27. by Ron Seese, WB7ASC


Today is June 21, a beautiful



The winner would have the strongest signal.

how did you finish? The answers were "Yes, the 2014 MVARA Shootout in LaCrosse, WI, and I finished first by quite a wide margin." The answer was given humbly, and I understand why. 


Musings of a shootout contestant

y'all

it was my first shootout as a contestant. i didn't put my best foot forward and have the tarheels tested, i went with the hustler roof mounted stuff since i had used that setup in Hawaii and Alaska and was curious as to how it would perform in a controlled and measured environment. i was 14th. thanks Lon for your efforts. thanks **Russ W8UZZ** for sharing your pearls of wisdom. watch out for the Roadrunner next year.

being a number guy (degrees in quantitative methods) i wanted to measure my incremental changes such as adding cap hats and increasing the distance from top of coil to the cap hat, replacing the tarheel coil with a variable inductor, etc. i decided a spectrum analyzer would be my tool of choice, since it is what Lon uses at the shootouts. however, a new one was too pricey, and i did not want to gamble on a used one. i found a PC based unit, USB connected and powered, NEW, for under \$300.00. the unit is a Velleman PC-SCOPE (and spectrum analyzer) model PCSU1000. available on ebay.

the CD which came with the unit would have been perfect for a PC with XP, however my PC of choice is my Toshiba laptop with Windows 8.1 which i use for everything CCN related. An email to Velleman customer support received a well timed response with cookbook details on how to install in a windows 8.1 environment. the email included links to the Velleman web site with: drivers and an updated application program in a nice ZIP file. The instructions also



led me step by step in a windows 8.1 setting change necessary to install the drivers. the instructions were perfect.

in spectrum analyzer mode, i can observe the transmitted signal on the screen, and then save to a file which contains the magnitude of the signal to 3 significant digits. this degree of specificity is more than enough for me to measure the effect of changes made.

General Discussion - Open to General Membership

Four discussion items were listed on the agenda prepared by Board Chairman George Huett, W6LJK, who was unable to attend the Eyeball. No additional items were brought up during the meeting. Your Acting Chairman apologizes in advance for being unable to accurately record all comments on all items. I didn't sign up to be Secretary, but I did my best to fill the void.

Items 1 & 3 were submitted by the 4th Area Director Jim Higgins, KB3PU, on behalf of Buddy Spiegel, W3BS. The topic of mobile check-ins was raised at Eyeball 2014 and Item 1 requests a continuation of that discussion. Since Item 3 involves a specific suggestion involving mobile check-ins, we skipped over Item 1 and discussed Item 3. Both Items are listed below for the sake of completeness.

Item 1 "Consideration for mobile check-ins during our nets. This was raised last year, and was handled by directing the member who asked about it to his area director, the 10th area. I have asked Ray about this, but he has ignored my question. I would like to see some discussion on this subject. Maybe a possible idea is to have the mobiles asked for at the beginning of each area, and asking the stations on frequency to listen up for the mobile. It would not take any longer than check-ins do now. If I had-n't prearranged for relay stations on the west coast, I might not have been able to participate in as many nets from HI as I did. East coast NCSes weren't hearing me from Honolulu."

Item 3 WHILE THE CURRENT NCS GUIDELINES STATES

- "13. The check-in list is taken beginning with
 - (1) Master Degree holders and their clubs and special event calls;
 - (2) Original Charter Signers; and Charter Members;
 - (3) DX Stations;

SINCE THE NCS GUIDELINES DO NOT PROVIDE AN OPPORTUNITY FOR MOBILES TO CHECK-IN WITHOUT GOING HEAD-ON WITH MORE POWERFUL FIXED BASE STATIONS, THEREFORE, THE 3905 CENTURY REVISES THE NCS GUIDELINES REGARDING CHECK-INS TO BE, [suggested rev is in RED]

ITEM 3 DISCUSSION / COMMENTS FOLLOW: (to Chair's best ability to keep up)

- N3WD Applies equally well to both mobiles and QRP.
- AA9ZF Not a problem from NCS standpoint
- WA2JIM Isn't this the same as "any relays?"
- KK4CMC Better since some just won't relay.
- N3WD (Responding to WA2JIM) Better because it would be done when checking in <u>each</u> call area.
- K2SFS (Hard to read my notes looks like he suggested doing this after checking in all areas vs after each area.)
- K5SRG (Responding to AA9ZF) Same as calling for additional check-ins.
- W2UJ Same as calling for additional check-ins.
- KB3PU Seems to be covered by calling for additional check-ins if weak stations are relayed as they should be. Just need to improve relaying.
- WB5FDP Should we poll the Net Coordinators and NCSes? (Chair heard general agreement to this comment)

General consensus (by show of hands) is that there is support for this idea and as suggested by WB5FDP, we'll poll the Net Coordinators and NCSes for input via the 3905ccnNCS reflector.)

A mobile operator may work our nets from any location using his mobile station as a remote station as long as he is using VHF/UHF as the link and as long as that station is in the same state, Canadian province/territory, or DXCC entity as the operator. A mobile operating remote as just defined should mark his/her cards as /M."

- W3BS was told having a 2kw generator made him portable.
- KB3PU (responding to W3BS) Not portable based on current definition of mobile. We shouldn't be changing things because a few make incorrect statements.

AA9ZF -

N3WD – mobile is any operable vehicle, land, sea, air.

KCOMS -

KS9WI - always heard mobile it was able to move without cutting something

- WA2JIM (in response to someone) mobile in own driveway is not mobile because it's at your fixed location.
- K2SFS use honor system
- KOHNM. AA9ZF, KG8WL no problem with mobile switching to portable status during a net (which would be allowed under the proposed definition change)

- KI4DFS (responding to KG8WL above) define "movable" when some bridges are only 10' and antennas can be higher.
- W2UJ problem when W1ABC on a tristate switches from mobile to portable and gets all calls on two rounds.
- KOWJ why not?
- KB3PU Agree with Russ. This is not clarification, it's an outright change because of disagreement with the present definition, not confusion over it.
- ACORL leave it to NCS. (only one supporter for this idea based on show of hands)
- W8UZZ if they burn gas and write cards they deserve to be able to swap from mobile to portable.
- KB3PU Other mobiles elsewhere also deserve a chance. It's asking for a problem.
- WF4H Same issue as running one club 1st round, another 2nd round. (Referring to a clarification we had to make to the Net Guide some time back to stop this practice that pushed the limits too far)
- KG8WL 1 2 rounds still leaves 3rd round.
- KB3PU (responding to KG8WL) Propagation has gone to heck by the 3rd round on certain nets.
- K6YEK Differences in parsing. No matter how we define things the definition will be dissected.
- General consensus (by show of hands) is that there is support for clarifying the definition of mobile and Mobile operation. Up to Buddy to make a carefully thought out proposal containing wording that doesn't introduce problematic consequences.

Item 4. Discussion item submitted on behalf of Jim, WB7PTC by the 7th Area Director Ricky Asper, AC7RA.

The addition of a option to the Master's Degree for the Worked All States YL requirement. I have been on the net all bands for the past 6 years and in that time I have only been able to make contacts with 19 YLs in 12 different state. There is an option for the Net Controller requirement that is achievable and only requires the applicant skills to achieve, unlike the WAS YL requirement that is beyond the applicant control. If it is acceptable to have an option for the operators skill (NCS), then why not one that time has proven is extremely unlikely to be obtainable?

ITEM 4 DISCUSSION / COMMENTS FOLLOW:

- WB5FDP Must "be there" to make the needed contacts.
- KI4DFS 67 members have already achieved Masters under the current requirements.
- W2UJ the first member to achieve Masters was located in California (probably the hardest place from which to earn this award)

KG8WL – Ralph (and others) have worked YLs in 50 states.

June Board of Director's Meeting (Continued)

- N3WD A total of 237 WAS YL awards have been issued.
- KB3PU As Awards Committee Chair I hear off and on from occasional members wanting to change the requirements for the Masters Degree Award. From those working toward the award (and usually close to achieving it except for one or two difficult requirements) the desire is to reduce requirements, while from those who have earned a Masters the desire is to tighten them. As KI4DFS and N3WD said, many have met the Masters requirement for earning a WAS YL Award (35 states) and we should leave these requirements alone.
- By show of hands, 1 person in favor of considering a change to the requirements for earning a Masters Degree Award.
