Please consider picking up and running one of our nets on a weekly basis.

First, we'll continue working on revising the by-laws, taking into consideration the feedback we received this past summer during the Eyeball. Second, since our Membership Chairman has completed his move to South Carolina, this committee will resume its projects. Third, the Awards Committee has some ideas in their bucket that it will be pursuing. One big step forward is that they have found a person proficient in Adobe Acrobat who has updated award applications with fill-in-the-blank technology. This will make it easier for people to fill out and submit award applications.

As many of you are aware, Kirk Frazier, AA1NA, has stepped up to the plate to host the 2020 annual Eyeball. This is a great time to visit with other members, meet people with whom you've made contacts, and have a lot of fun. Major Progressive Awards

The Master's Degree, our awards system's highest distinction, requires 2000-Point certificates on primary and secondary bands. Here, we'll list 1000-Point and up, plus we will include 500-Point awards for CW, digital modes and 160M all modes.

DX Award

Our DX Award is simple in concept, but difficult to complete when we run afoul of the propagation gods. It requires twenty-five confirmed contacts with twenty-five unique countries other than the US.

The Master's Degree

The 3905 Century Club Master's Degree is a pinnacle achievement, which requires persistence and dedication in operating on the Club's nets. Many newcomers are intrigued by the concept, if not daunted by the formidable requirements of the award. In this section, we will discuss the award and its prerequisites.

History

The first Master's Degree was awarded to Wendell R. Turner, AB6TX, in July 1993. Since that time, a total of seventy-one Masters have joined Wendell, the most recent being Ralph A. Mitchell, KG8WL, in August 2017.

Many Masters continue their presence on the nets and their pursuit of awards after achieving the distinction. (As we like to say, there is life after the Master's!). Approximately one-third of those seventyone Masters are regularly active on our nets today.

Requirements

The Master's signifies mastery of operation on our nets. Therefore, a broad collection of achievements, as represented by individual awards on several nets, is required. After designating a primary and secondary band, which can be 40M SSB, 75M SSB, and 160M SSB, the applicant must achieve the following awards:

Primary Band 2000-Point Progressive Alphabet Soup Baker's Dozen Certificate Hunter's

DX

NCS Basic (or Poker Player on Secondary Band) Night Owl Nomad (or Alphabet Soup, Certificate Hunter, WAS – Capitals, AND WAS – YL on Secondary Band) Numbers Racket Officers Poker Player Worked All States Worked All States – YL Secondary Band 2000-Point Progressive DX Numbers Racket Night Owl Officers Additional Requirements Additionally, the Master's applicant must hold a 100-Point Award on the following 3905 Century Club nets: 40M SSB **75M SSB** 160M SSB 40M RTTY or 80M RTTY 40M CW 80M CW

There is a non-award-based requirement as well. The applicant must have demonstrated *significant service to the club* beyond just earning the awards listed above.

Approval

The Master's Degree Award application is submitted to the Awards Secretary, who will check requirements and then forward a recommendation to the Board of Directors, who will vote on final approval.

The new Master will be formally (or informally) welcomed to the elite subgroup by the Masters in presence at the next Eyeball gathering. Our most recent Master, Ralph, was given a "celebrity roast" initiation at the 2018 Eyeball, which was great fun for all! (See photo below).

As a small encouragement for brevity and conciseness, candidates for each office will be placed on the ballot in order based on the length of their personal statements... shortest thru longest, with those candidates that have not provided a statement listed after those that have.



My dad, my Elmer, the most important man in my life, became a silent key. K9FZ, Al, OM # 2313, was taken too soon, his heart just stopped. My dad enjoyed the hobby of amateur radio since 1968 when he received his novice license. As a little girl, I have memories of him, tipping back a cold one in the




basement of our home in Superior Wisconsin, making contact after contact. I can still hear him all these years later... WA9YRA calling CQ, CQ, CQ.... I would dangle my feet as I sat on his metal stool in his shack hoping my mom wouldn't make me go to bed, listening to him for hours on end. You may have heard him on the air with one of his many call signs, WA9YRA, KE0IW, AB5HF, AA9MP AH6JG or HL9JG.

My dad retired as a Lt. Cornel from the United States Army after 28 years of service. It was during his tour in Hawaii in 1989 that he had helped me achieve my novice license. It was then that we started sharing his shack and I was now the voice calling CQ, CQ, CQ, with the best Elmer a girl could have teaching me the ropes. In 2012, I passed my general class test after years of "nagging" me to "just study and get it done so you can work all that good dx!" My dad was so excited... I remember it like it was yesterday. When I passed, he introduced me to OMISS, the 3905CCN and I worked several new countries all in the first week.

My dad was a member of so many different clubs, he enjoyed them all. He was an avid DX'er and a huge supporter of many DX organizations. I likely will never achieve standings with the ARRL nearly as impressive as my dad's, but I will try. He was most recently working on his awards with the 3905 CCN in hopes of achieving his Masters.

He retired from his second career in March of 2018 after he survived a helicopter crash in California; all of us who loved him were grateful we finally had him home from his years of traveling for work. He spent the last years of his life with his wife of 35 years, traveling for leisure (finally).



He loved his children, his grandchildren, his siblings, and his dog, and enjoyed spending time with them.



He was working on his shack and finally



applying for all the awards he had been working on for years. He had a mission to help me update my station with a new an-

tenna/tower and talking me into taking my extra exam in the near future.

I would like to thank every person who ever made contact with my dad. He thoroughly enjoyed each and every one of them and after 51 years of contacts, on September 18th, 2019, my dad became a silent key. It was not a moment any of us were prepared for. He was only 67 years old. There was so much left to do and so much left unsaid. He had so much more to teach us all. On September 21st, I did the most difficult thing I have ever had to do. After sharing the hobby with him for 30 years, it was my honor to fulfill his request that if he passed away, I would give my dad, K9FZ, his last call on the 40m OMISS net. Dad, I'm gonna miss you...

Bureau Items

Key take away points...

Cards that exceed 3 1/2 by 5 1/2 inches will not be accepted. This has been a long standing issue and has come to a point where we have to stand hard and fast on this one as it is getting out of hand.

Check the online GIB look up before you send cards.

Check your balance often. We try to let you know when you are getting low (usually \$2 or 2 SSASEs). You know your activity level and if that is enough warning or not. I literally had 1 station in the last 24 hours get a 2 ounce and 2 3 ounce envelopes dropping him from above where we normally send a note to 75 cents. This is an issue for those using Dean's logger as any station with a buro balance below \$1 is listed as direct by his logger.

Friday night and Saturday night, Gene was checked in on 40m with club call K8BF and special event call W8O, all /P on the OH/PA line. In between, they worked the OSPOTA contest, Saturday 10am-6pm. They operated portable from a table at the state line.
