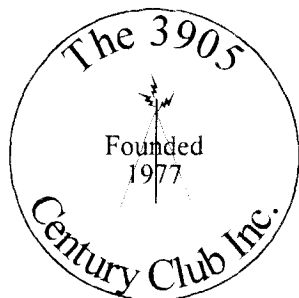

ARO-LOG 3.0 (3905 CC Version) Product Review

Jim Tester K17GO sent me a copy of his logging program ARO-LOG to review. I have never used a dedicated logging program, have always used a dBASE to keep track of my contacts. But, now that I see how a dedicated logging program works, I wish I had of come across one a long time ago.

Upon receiving the program, naturally the first thing I did was load the program and print out the manual. The manual was short, just one page. But, really that is all you need. The program is very straight forward and the learning time is short.

The version I tested was designed for use by The Century Club and was set up for the convenience of Century clubbers. When you enter the CC module you will find 40 meter, 75 meter, 160 meter, cw and RTTY modules. Within each module is a complete logging program, which includes almost everything you need. Including hit list, QSL's owed and needed. You

can check on just about everything from combo's to point used and point not used.

Entering data into the dBASE is simply a matter of filling in the blanks. When entering contacts all pertinent information is entered and can be referred to later, which includes spaces for VIPs, combos, state caps, etc!!!

I only entered about 30 calls for my test, but as the program is dos based it was very fast, access time to data seemed to come in excellent time.

I found the program to be very fast and easy to use, with about anything you could need in a logging program. For future versions I would like to recommend some additions that would be helpful to users. Mouse support would be handy and a module for printing labels would come in nice. naturally being a windows user I would like it to support windows. But, all in all I found this a very good program and if you are not happy with your present logging program, you may want to give this one some serious consideration.

Clint, W1XN, Works the Net from 50 States

It took 3 years and 62,000 miles of travel but I managed to visit all 50 states and to check in to the 3905 Net from each. I have been able to check in from some states more than once, but that mileage reflects only the first visit. Most states were visited by flying into certain central airports, such as Denver, Salt Lake City, Chicago and Memphis. Then, using rental cars, I would make side trips to nearby states for short stays. What fun it has been to see so many places. It was most interesting to witness the different operating problems and conditions in the different parts of the country.

Less than a year ago, I married Kathy, who likes to go with me on expeditions. Our honeymoon was to Florida and I took my rig with me. Kathy loves to travel and has been driver at times while I operate the rig.

My last state for the Net was South Dakota, which I did from the shadow of Mount Rushmore. That's me and Kathy in the photograph(s). In celebration of the 50th state event, I am sending miniature flags to all those 48 stations I worked that night, after I receive my QSL.

My rig is a Yaesu FT 747 and an AEA antenna tuner which fit in a bag small enough to fit under the seat of an airplane. The antenna is a Hamstick with a magnetic mount. The power cable has big clips that I connect directly to the car battery. I use a ground wire which I clip to the frame under the car.

I always found picture post cards to serve as QSL cards. Many of you have remarked that you enjoyed the pictures. I have sent out about 2,000 cards. Sometimes it was very difficult to find post cards, but I did and now have a collection which I display on the walls of my home.

I sent out my own award to stations who worked me in 30 or more states/provinces. Those stations are: AA5MP, W3PYZ, K0AFY, K6FO, W14Y, AA5ES, N7DZK, KB5MRU, W4BKP, N8IFS, KF9EB, N0NYG, K5FNS, KE9OI.

My next expedition will be to the Cayman Islands. Look for me on the 40 and 75 nets on 1 and 2 March 1995 as ZF2EW. I also plan to work in the ARRL DX contest on 4 March.
