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# Yep—The 2003 Elections Are Upon Us

During the meeting on August 10th, the Board of Directors approved the election procedures for 2003.

Nominations for President, Vice President and Directors of the odd numbered callareas are open now.

The President and Vice President serve a one year term while the Directors are elected for a two year term.

Nomination Period: The 3905 Century Club opened nominations for Directors of the odd numbered and DX call areas, President and Vice President starting September 01, 2002.

Nominations will close at the November meeting of the Board of Directors on November 09, 2002.

The board will approve the candidates at that time assuming we have sufficient numbers of candidates. There must be at least one nominee for each Area Directorship and there must be at least two nomi-

nees each for the offices of President and Vice President.

Requirements: As stated in the Bylaws and Constitution, a candidate for Area Director must hold a 100 Point Membership Certificate on any one of the 3905 Century Club Nets.

To become a candidate for Area Director, a member must announce on a Century Club Net that he or she is a candidate for the position.

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# 2003 Elections (Continued)

The Net Control Station is responsible for making sure that the President is informed of the announcement if he is not on the Net at that time.

As stated in the Bylaws and Constitution, a candidate for President and Vice President must hold a 100 Point Membership Certificate on any one of the 3905 Century Club Nets.

To qualify to stand for President (and Vice-President) a member must be nominated by his/her Director, at a meeting of the Board of Directors. Such nominations shall be made by individual Directors, guided by their individual consciences, and by the recommendations of their constituents. It will be deemed improper for a member to lobby a Director other than his/her own Director.

Balloting Period: Balloting for all offices will commence upon approval of the candidates at the Board of Directors meeting on November 9<sup>th</sup>, 2002. No ballots for any office or candidate will be accepted prior to that date. Voting by email or snail-mail will conclude on January 15<sup>th</sup>, 2003 for all offices.

<u>Voting for Area Directors:</u> Ballot-

ing for Area Directors will be exclusively by either snail-mail (USPS) or e-mail votes. Each ballot must include a minimum of the following to be counted.

- (1) The call-sign of the member voting.
- (2) The 100 point certificate number of the person voting.
- (3) The callsign of the person being voted for in that election.

Note: Your license address must be located within the call area of the candidate for which you are voting. In other words, the election is only for odd numbered call areas or the DX area Directors. Votes from members outside of these areas will be rejected.

Mail and email ballots for the odd numbered (and DX) Directors are to be sent to Bill Martin - WM4SG, Club President. The President will count the ballots upon close of voting and will designate a second member to verify the ballots. The election results for Area Directors will be announced on the nets during the On-Air Election for President and Vice President on January 30th.

<u>Voting for President and Vice</u> <u>President:</u> Ballots for President and Vice President may be cast either by email or US mail as well and must be sent to the Election Monitor, Earl - W1BML by January 15<sup>th</sup>, 2003. W1BML will compile the results of the mail and email voting and forward the results, listed by individual vote, to the On-The-Air Election Monitor, Frank - AAØZP following the close of voting on January 15<sup>th</sup>.

Annual On-The-Air-Election: The Annual On-The-Air election for President and Vice President will be conducted by Frank AAØZP, the night of January 30th, 2003. Hugh NT4Z has been designated the alternate Election Monitor and will also keep a running count of the votes as they are cast.

The first half of the election will be conducted on the 40 meter SSB Net frequency from 0001 until 0159, at which time the voting will continue on the 75 meter SSB net frequency until, in the final judgment of AAØZP, voting has ceased to be active.

Immediately following the close of elections, AAØZP will count the final votes and announce the election winners. The final results of the election will be approved at the February meeting of the Board of Directors.



Nominations for these awards come from Board members, general members and the Presidential Advisory Committee.



The Rxer circuit was a small loop antenna fed into a parallel tuned circuit which was tuned for 7.2335 MHz. There, the RF was rectified in a germanium full wave bridge. The DC voltage was fed down a 40 foot shielded cable to a metal box with two terminals for a digital milli-voltmeter connection. transmitter used for all contestants was an IC706 with a cigar lighter plug. The output was set to 50W for all contestants as the rig was switched between vehicles being tested. The antenna under test was placed above a marker which was located at 40 Meters from the receiving loop.



I just returned from a fantastic trip to 4X (Israel) in July/August 2002 and I encourage any 3905CCN readers who have not been, or are interested in going, to consider a trip. I was part of a Solidarity Mission of people who came to Israel to show their support in these difficult times.

There is no question that the times are difficult as Israel battles a double whammy of a bad high tech economy combined with almost 2 years of terrorist warfare directed at it's citizens. Yet, throughout the trip I felt well cared for and was convinced, even more so, that I had made the right decision to visit. This was not my first trip. I lived in Jerusalem in grad school and also have made quite a few other trips before this

There were so many highlights, far too numerous to mention, but I thought I'd highlight a few: Shabbat at the Western Wall in Jerusalem, a volunteer day with "Sar-El" (Volunteers for Israel) where we assembled 3500 gas mask respirators for asthmatic children at an Army Base. (Let's hope they never have to be used!). We also visited with the head of Emer-

Also we saw some of the "Star Wars" technology employed by the Israeli Air Force in its "Pilotless Drone (UAV) Planes." But by far, the highlight was hearing "Thank You" from just about everyone I talked to, who were so appreciative that we were there, showing our support.

As far as the Ham Radio highlights went, I took my 2M HT with me and made contact with numerous other Israeli Hams, including Joe Obstfeld, the head of the Israel Amateur Radio Club. His web page, http://geocities.com/ siliconvalley/horizon/8820, has a very interesting story of the joint 4X/JY Club operation soon after the Israel-Jordan Peace Treaty where JY1 himself (the late King Hussein) came for repeated visits. The Repeater System in Israel is very easy to use. Often times, they are linked into a network that stretches the entire N/S length of the country. Probably the most interesting contact I had was with 4Z5JQ, Teddy, who was "Bicycle Mobile" in Tel Aviv.

I wanted to try to check in on the CW nets, but time and circumstances did not allow. Still I did take time to pose on Dizengoff Street in Tel Aviv, attired with some possible well known Century Club, attire, if you attended the WA eyeball in 2001.

Only in America... the budgets for advertising non-essential items, like soft drinks, exceed the economies of many third-world nations...

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
# Hams Do Have More Fun by KØDG

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# Tracking QSL Cards & Awards—An Approach by WA4BKW

The following is not meant to be the answer to any of your problems.

It's more of an example of how one person has taken charge of the growing number of QSL cards (some 5000 at last count) to manage the process of keeping track of which cards to use for the various awards.

Like some of you, it took working on the 1000 point award to realize how stupid I was getting to that point. For example, blowing the capital of Alaska on the 100 point award or using more DX stations other than Canada, than required for the 500 point award. This is not going to change much unless someone takes a new person under his wing and gives him some guidance.

But it's hard to figure if a new member is going to stick with it long enough to start worrying about keeping track of the cards. The real 'rude awakening' came when I decided that there were enough cards available to go for the 2000 point award.

Marital bliss was stretched to the limit with stacks of cards lying on all available open spaces. There had to be a better way. For those who are working on progressive awards — and others as well — let me show you what I have devised.

Enter the computer. It makes it easier to develop a system to keep track of various items and helps eliminate the 'hunt and hope' method of shuffling through cards each time you need to find certain categories for the different awards. My computer sense is 'on the need to know' basis and I don't have the super skills and knowledge the a more proficient user would have. Then again, I figure the majority of you out there are probably in the same boat with me.

### Forms-

There are several forms that I use. You find out very quickly that one needs to keep track of the cards used for progressive awards since they can't be used but only once.

Form "A" keeps track for me. I can quickly double-check to make sure

that a card has not been used before as well as letting me know what portables, mobiles or wild cards were used were used and in which state.

This is in spread-sheet format since its primary use is to check call signs and the alphabetical icon takes care of that easily. And it's not hard to use.

The next two forms are in data base since there are times when more than one category is needed to determine certain information.

Form "B" keeps track of certificate numbers. This gives me a ready source for the certificate numbers award. It also gives the Wild Card availability. When one of these calls is used as a Wild Card for an award it's marked with a (WC) on Form "A".

It's also easy to find sequential numbers for the Poker Player Award.

Form "C" keeps track of several possibilities. It's set-up with the following categories: CALL, MOBILE, CAPITAL, YL, VIP, QRP, DX, LATE NET, and PORTABLE. These are my listings. Someone else may not like these or even have others that could be added. For example a CW, RTTY or others could be added. I have one of these for each band. By organizing

ways it allows me to see where I stand with the various mobiles for the Baker's Dozen Award (by call & mobile); Worked All States Mobile-Caps-YL (by each category); it gives a list of VIP contacts; DX (by DX & call puts the DX in alphabetical order); a listing of Late Net Contacts (by Late Net & Call); Portable contacts (gives a list of those portables and state -- it

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# Tracking QSL Cards and Awards (Continued)

At present I am working on my 40 meter 1000 and 2000 point awards simultaneously. Again, anxious to get the 500 point endorsement, I wasted a couple of good cards that I could now use and have others that could have been used if patience were exercised and just waited a little while.

I have pulled down the award forms from the web page and they are in the word processor. When cards are received, they are checked against the log, then added to the above forms where they apply. The calls are checked against the needs of the 1000 point award. If usable, they are typed in the correct slot. If they are not needed then I go to the 2000 point award form. I try to fill in Part III first since this part requires calls to have different prefixes.

If the card doesn't fit it gets checked against Part II and finally against Part I. It gives you the chance to move cards from Part III to Part II to Part II. For example: if I had a 1x2, 2x1 or 2x2 under Florida and received a card for Florida that would fit in Part III with the same prefix, it could be added and the 1x2, etc. could be moved to Part II or Part I as needed.

The same thing can be done with YLs. With DX fill in the minimums with the different DX needed then use the Canadian contacts to fill in, saving other DX for the next progressive award.

At present I know that I need contacts in just five more states to complete the 1000 point and the 2000 point Part I is complete; Part II is nearly 50% complete; and Part III has five states completed with a smattering of calls throughout the form. It's kind of exciting to watch the award's progression.

There's also frustration when you keep looking for one Vermont that you need or those two South Dakotas. But patience will bring results. After the first time, I never thought that a second 75 meter Hawaii contact would ever come my way for the

2000; but it did. To me, a great part of the excitement of the award is watching it grow as much as receiving it. If a card is used, then I go to the award form "C" and add the call to the list. Then the card is filed alphabetically by area number and "A", "K", "N", "W", DX and Canada. In this way the cards can be used for other awards if needed and then pulled when the consecutive award is completed.

When a mobile or portable is received, it is checked and used the same way except that the call is typed on the form in lower case for the state operated. It can be replaced if a regular call for that state is received and the mobile card can be moved to the next level or added to the mobile category. The mobile requirement is one of the last areas I fill. The same is true for a portable. They are placed in lower case and used where needed.

Poker Player-

After completing the 2000 point award for 75 meters, I was feeling pretty cocky. After all, over ten years of participating on the net and well over four thousand cards, one should be able to come up with enough to get close to the Poker Player. (Right!!!) And I thought sifting through the cards for the 2000 was a headache. That was a breeze compared to sorting for this award. I gave up! There had to be an easier way.

Hello computer! Once again these are things that are furthest from your mind when your participation on the nets is getting enough contacts to earn WAS. Form "D" was born. It contains all the different cards on a particular net. This took some time to enter all those cards but it was worth it. Now I add cards as I get them and it is relatively painless.

A data base program is used with the headings 1-2-#-3-4-5; where "1" is the first letter of a two-letter prefix; "2" is the second letter of a two-letter prefix or the first letter of a single letter

prefix; "#" is the area; and "3-4-5" represent the letters of the suffix. The example shows the calls organized by the second letter, "#" and then the first, second and third letter of the suffix.

I'm looking for that Royal Flush. I've got one 'four in a row' and three 'three in a row'. At least it was easy just to scan the data base instead of refilling all the cards or some other method to try and find where I stand.

By adjusting how you organize the order of the calls it's easy to scan the list and see if you have: 3 of a kind—three like letters in the suffix; straight—alphabetical runs of the three letter suffix; etc. It sure beats shuffling and matching the various combinations by hand. The dealer's choice came from Chart "A" where the certificate numbers are listed. In short order I was able to figure out that I had everything except the straight flush and the royal flush complete.

As I said at the beginning, this is not the definitive answer to tracking awards, but it is working for me. If nothing else it may get someone else working on something better. Like many Century Club members who have been around for a while, better than 50% of the check-ins on a net have been worked and on 75 meters it's higher than that.

But, it's still exciting for me to top the Baker's Dozen with that needed contact or finally find that one call that will complete the required number for particular state; especially when the card comes in to confirm it and it can be added to the listing.

As I said, the chase to me is as exciting as completing an award. As I have learned it will be completed if you just have "patience" and not try to complete the award too quickly – only leads to frustration.

Good luck on your paper chasing!

Next up, Power Ranking time...as in who's got the Masters' Degree in sight and who's down the track chasing the leaders...

In honor of the settlement of the Major League Baseball labor situation (yes, I have express written notarized consent from one Commissioner Kennesaw Mountain Landis to publish this data), we pay tribute to our most active members by assigning them appropriate roles in the cast!

First, seeking Masters' Degree # 13 are two calls that will fill the roles, quite nicely, of Bud Selig and Players' Union head Donald Fehr:

- NJ2LH can become the first club station to qualify with either the 75 meter Poker Player or the Net Controller award. Contraction of the club station is not an issue at this time.
- N5OHL is less than 10 DX and the Nite Owl away on 75, and tips me off in a short Aug. 28 email in response to a comment about how to use the Super Wild Card (Masters') number on club awards that he likes the # 13 (and you can HAVE it, for all I care) "but it will be more like # 30 before I get enough DX on 75 meters." Of course, Jim adds that he will work the 75 meter net "real hard" for his DX this winter, so let's support his efforts, fellow players! And remember: Jim is the sixth station to have the Poker Player on both 40 and 75 meters, which means he does NOT need the Net Controller award if he goes for

his Masters' – and the other five stations that pulled off this feat ARE Masters' themselves!

Right behind these two, in the ranks of those who would be considered team player representatives, are KD3O and WK5S, who have all the required basic awards in hand but both of them sill need 1k and 2k awards on a single band. Jim, who would be from the Baltimore Orioles, needs his pair on 40 meters while Steve, from the Texas Rangers, needs his duo on 75 meters to join W4NNO, KI5RN and AA0ZP as former club presidents with the highest honor attained.

Also, AA1NZ (nearest team being the Boston Red Sox) and AA4US (from the Florida Marlins; you'd think I'd stick him with the Tampa Bay Deviled Rays??) still hold all required Basic awards, but they yet do not have their 1k and 2k certificates (or any new RTTY/PSK net awards) on *any* bands. Guys, is this situation any kind of incentive for you???

Next comes those stations that need only one Basic award and, once again, this section has no changes except for assigning them to the appropriate team.

These three still need only their 80 meter CW net certificate:

- WQ1H (Dave, from the Mets because Boston is already taken)
- KA4BHL (Clarence in TN, nearest team is the Cardinals)
- N8DXR (Detroit Tigers, but

should be the Lions who *deserve* contraction by MLB for being *that* bad, figure that one out)

And K1DWI, from the Yankees, still needs his 40 meter RTTY basic award. He gets that squad not out of money but just because the other teams have their reps in place, as you see.

Last, among the Bleacher Bums at good ol' Wrigley Field in Chicago, are these diehard stations who need only the following Basic certificates to have worked 100 point awards on all our required nets (again, the new RTTY and PSK nets not counted toward the Masters). No changes since the last check of this section of the right field grand-stand, so:

160 SSB - WM0F, N1EM (via KV1J) and K5YAA—40 RTTY - W2WW, WV2X, AA3FC, KG7Q, K8PG, WK9O—40 CW - W9VB—80 CW - W1BYH, KE3ZZ, AC5SU, K6FO, W7DO, WM9H, K0WJ

As for stations in this section regarding their point needs for the very top level, that's also as before: WM9H, W9VB needs the 2k awards on 40 and 75, and W7DO needs his 1k and 2k on 75 meters. If they are waiting until the Cubs get the pennant, WK9O will be glad to tell them not to hope for much on THAT end...
