
A Resistor Puzzle (Contributed by Chris—VE7HCB)

In an electric resistor assembly, invented by Thomas C Wright, International Resistance Co, four resistors are encased side by side with lead wires as shown.

Now the resistors can be joined or used in about 51 different ways.

If the individual resistors are 1, 2, 4, & 8 ohms respectively, a number of values can be produced.



There is a maximum of 15 ohms, but not all values from 1 to 15.

Stupid People Are Alive & Well —Yes, Even In Our Hobby

Deliberate interference with a Canadian net by an Ohio amateur has resulted in a \$12,000 Notice of Apparent Liability for Forfeiture (NAL) from the FCC.

The FCC has alleged that Ronald E. Sauer, WE8E, of Bedford Heights violated Part 97 rules prohibiting deliberate and malicious interference, transmission of music and fail-

ure to identify.

An FCC agent used direction-finding techniques to track the source of the interference on 7.055 MHz to Sauer's home and conducted an inspection.

The FCC said Sauer "admitted that he had been playing music and deliberately jamming the frequency of 7.055 MHz."

Based on its findings, the FCC concluded that the \$12,000 fine was justified.

The FCC ordered Sauer to pay the fine within 30 days.

All Board members, or their alternates, were present for the meeting with the exception of the DX and 6th Areas.

In attendance, aside from many observing members, were K9TWV, WM4SG, KE3NR, WQ1H, WA2JIM W3QZ, KB4IT, N5UJB, KL7OR, KD8QQ, and AAØZP.

After approving previous meeting minutes and financial reports, the Board turned to new business.

A discussion was held on standardization of the size of QSL cards. It was decided to put a message on the website asking people to use standard sizes.

Next, President WM4SG reported that the annual election cycle this year will begin on November 1st. The Board approved that decision.

WM4SG also announced that Jim—KD3O has agreed to remain as the Club Webmaster & Historian for another year.

A proposal to amend the bylaws to allow a broader mix of members on the awards committee by removing the current restrictions was approved by unanimous vote.

Tentatively, pending approval, the 2004 Eyeball will be held in Oregon and the 2005 Eyeball in Georgia, with a strong possibility of 2006 being held in Missouri.

After lengthy discussions, two proposals for limiting the number of callsigns that any one person can have when checking into the nets were both defeated during voting.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

This begins our coverage of the Eyeball with many pictures contributed by WM9H and others.









AK8R— Dale MacLean—Master Degree # 14

Known to many of us as "Late Eight", AK8R—Dale MacLean of Michigan has become the 14th member of the 3905 Century Club to complete the long road to a Masters Degree Award.

Dale has been an active member of the nets for years and is often a Net Control on the 75 meter Early Nets.

AK8R holds an Extra Class License and resides in Fenton, Michigan, with a former call of KC8IMK.

Asked about his ham radio history, here is what Dale had to say:

I was introduced to ham radio by my 5th grade teacher in the early '60's and studied for my novice ticket. At that time you had to go to the FCC office in Detroit on Saturday mornings.

My father always worked Saturdays so the 2 hour drive was never made. I had a Hallicrafters receiver and built a 90 watt CW transmitter w/a pair of 6146's in the finals that was in the ARRL Handbook.

Then along came High School, girls, sports, ect. and radio got put on the back shelf. Thirty years later I had a major garage fire that destroyed everything including the "old antique radios".

My replacement insurance would not pay for old radios but would buy me equal value replacements.

In Sept. 1997 a got my No-code Tech and upgraded to Tech Plus by December and for six months lived on the 80m and 40m CW Novice bands and getting a WAS on CW.

I upgraded to General in the summer of '98 and soon found the 3905 CCN. I was soon checking in on the 80 and 40m nets 7 nights a week, the rest is history. This winter when checking for new awards to work for I found I had all the blanks filled on the Master Degree application with both 75m and 40m as the preferred band,

no secondary band, except the 100 point numbers for CW and RTTY. I got the CW right away and was just 4 contacts short when RTTY suddenly shutdown for the summer. The KC Eyeball RTTY Net finished the last contacts needed.

This brings the total Masters roster to 14 members, of which most are still very active on our nets each night.

Reflections of a Newbie on the 3905CCN Nets—KCOOCC

I know we all have our stories on how we started in Amateur Radio. Mine is probably very similar to many. I found listening to an old short wave radio in the attic as a youth exciting as I heard the various Morse code signals and foreign broadcasts, but I never ventured beyond the listening stage. I am a licensed pilot and have been an air traffic controller since 1974; I use radio communications throughout my life.

However, I recently discovered that these types of radio communications do not compare with the enjoyment of hunting for contacts and the other intrinsic rewards I get with Amateur Radio. More specifically, my experience on the 3905-Century Club Nets.

What started me down this path was last year's field day. My soon to become mentors, Gary, NØOXV and Dale, WAØNKE were responsible in my introduction to Amateur Radio. Gary and I both fly R/C model airplanes. During field day last year, Gary and Dale set up a radio station at our flying field. I remember Gary showing his collection of QSO cards from all over the world and explaining the various methods of making contacts. This intrigues me and I flippantly mentioned that I would like to try it. Before I knew it, they had me started on the licensing process.

At 50, I am a newbie, I earned my technician license in September of 2002, Code and General in November (taking this test made me more nervous than finals in college) and my Extra in January. The path to obtain these licenses really impressed upon me that I have a special privilege and responsibility in which to learn and explore the world of Amateur Radio. Before starting on this journey, I did not have a clue about the many activities and involvement of amateur radio. I am still on a steep learning curve.

Anyway, back to my story. In November 02, after earning my General, Gary came over to my house, help me set up a temporary 40M dipole and let me use one of his radios, an ICOM 735. He explained what various nets do and mentioned that the

3905-Century Club is a good one that provides an environment to learn the process, make contacts and exchange QSO cards. I immediately set a lofty goal to work all 50 states. I soon realized there are operators that have worked every county in the United States (3000+). My goal did not seem as lofty as I had first imagined.

After setting up the equipment, he demonstrated how to work the ICOM 735. Tune an antenna, and now the biggee, tuning to 7.233 at 0000Z to begin listening to the 3905 CCN. What's a call area? Why should I say contact or query and never break? What are the many fine awards they mentioned? How do I get them? Gary advised me to be patient. We listened through the check-ins. Wow! I am hearing from places all over the United States

Gary advised me that as soon as Net Control says, "Any more tens?" Give them your call sign. Should I say it phonetically or straight? Whatever you want. HOLY COW, this is much more complicated that air traffic control. Geez!!!! This was the night of November 21st. Actually the morning of November 22nd, it's that ZULU thing. Yes, that took some figuring out too. Anyway, I stated my call. I blurted out a combination of Kilo Charlie Zero Ohh Cee Cee."

I believe it was NT4Z that responded with, "KCOOCC what is your state?" "Missouri" "Ok, Missouri." "Have you been on the net before and are you good in the bureau?" "No", I stated, wondering if I violated some obscure rule by checking in, but I promised to get envelopes into the bureau first thing in the morning. Net then asked my name, I said Greg, he said OK Greg, and announced to the entire world, Net number 35 is KCØOCC Greg in Missouri, a newbie worth 1 bonus call.

Gary said something to the effect I had better get ready with my pencil and be sure to send the cards and envelopes out first thing in the morning. The calls did come. Who was that for? Mike fright, this is more stressful that vectoring airplanes around thunderstorms. What did he say?

Obviously, I flubbed some calls. I believe I provided Gary with a lot of comedy relief that night while trying to figure this net stuff out. What in the heck are bang bang, speed limit, triplets, triplets, magnum magnum, and maximum, maximum? Oh, is it that important to repeat their signal report and send yours too? What's with the bells at 0100Z?

I glad Gary was there to walk me through this. The net controller and my first contacts were very understanding. Poor Gary, he even had to work with me on keeping my logbook while the calls kept coming. That night, I felt I slowed the net down, but everyone treated me great. Everyone welcomed me to the net and by the time the net was over, I had made contacts with several people throughout the United States from my humble QTH.

Gary continued to come over to my house to work with me and monitor me for the next several weeks. I soon learned that a computer-logging program would be a great addition to my ham shack. I got the sense pretty early on when I inadvertently made a call to someone I had worked several weeks ago, they would immediately let me know that while they appreciated the call, we had worked before. I could tell by voice inflection that this "faux pas" is considered bad form. OOPS, my apologies!!!!!!

When my first cards arrived, the hook was set; I jumped with both feet. I checked out the website in more depth. After that, I realized I need a bigger antenna, but my space is limited. Gary and Dale mentioned that should I ever move, I should ensure space for a 200-foot tower and a 40m beam. I think they are kidding.

Still, I want to experience as much as possible, RTTY, PSK, CW, and mobile. I really love mobile, even my wife seems to enjoy listening to the various contacts we make while we are traveling, but wonders if I could silence the QRM.

While I remain intimidated about jumping into the CW nets, I set a personal goal to earn a Master's Degree in the 3905-Century Club. I realize it will take commitment, work, time and effort, but recognizing the call signs, voices and various locations of members that check in, provide me with a sense of community I never knew could exist on the airways.

Thank you to all who have helped me through contacts on the various nets and a bigger thanks to the 3905-Century Club for providing an environment to experience a side of amateur radio, make contacts, exchange QSO cards, have some fun, and for sending out some very fine awards.

By the way, when you hear me for the first time on a CW net, be patient and do not laugh. I am still learning.
