He has been a net controller, 80 meter CW net coordinator, 160 meter CW net coordinator, assistant 75 meter single-sideband net coordinator, and 75 meter single-sideband early net coordinator.

In addition, Rick was recently elected as vice president and chairman of the Board of Directors.

Rick was licensed in 1971 as WN5FDP while he was a high school student.

He became WB5FDP with his general class license and passed the advanced and extra class exams together in 1983.

From 1972 to 1980 Rick became interested in nets.

"Some were fun nets and some were traffic nets," Rick explained. "After trying my hand at net control on SSB, I moved to the CW nets and helped out there. Ar-

kansas Teenage Net, Razorback SSB Net Control, OZK Local CW Net (NTS), RN5 Region CW Net (NTS), CAN Area CW Net (NTS), Transcontinental Corps (NTS).

"Somewhere in there I picked up the ability to copy high speed CW which helped me ace the 20wpm test needed for my extra."

For a while, Rick held a first-class FCC Radiotelephone Operators License and was chief engineer for AM/FM radio stations.

He also worked with another ham in an aircraft radio shop (avionics) and got interested in Field Day.

"Tuning around the 160m bands one night to see if anything was there, I ran across the 3905 Century Club net," Rick said. "I checked back a few nights in a row and found that they were there every night.

I decided to check in, and after my first run of calls I was hooked."

Rick quickly worked 21 states and when the season ended on 160m, he had enough for my 100 point certificate issued on June 7th, 2003.

Then he moved to 80m to work on his 100 point certificate.

"I waited until I got a 100-point certificate before moving on to the next band then I moved to the CW nets, RTTY, PSK and the rest is history," Rick said. He now holds Master's Certificate #22 issued on July 4th, 2006.

Rick has 44 certificates and six more in the envelope waiting to get shipped out.

"It has been a pleasure to be a part of this excellent group of hams,"

Rick said. "I have made many friends and achieved so much in such a short time that I feel like I still owe the club something. I enjoy being a net control station and hearing others achieve their goals."

Rick was married in 1976, and says, "Yes she knew she was marrying a ham. The radio was in the front seat of my little car, and she had to fight for front seat room."

Rick has a son in college who has decided that maybe a ham license would be good for him to have.

Hugh MacDonald, AC7XF, of Bandon, Oregon, has been a ham since May 1990. He was first licensed in 1972 as WN6BBS.

Hugh discovered the 3905 CCN shortly after

he was licensed, when a friend wired a microphone into his NCX3. Previously he said he was "happy as a clam in deep sand," with CW.

He is retired from the Navy, medically after 21 years and for his entire career was an aircraft radio operator and flight technician.

Hugh has been married for 39 years to Kathy, KE6LNT, and they have three daughters. His daughter, Stacie, is licensed with the call KD7JPL.

Hugh has been a net control since 1992 and is now NCS on 80 meter CW nets and the 40 meter slow speed CW net.

"I also make occasional guest NCS appearances on RTTY and PSK nets," he said.

Pete Larsen, K7BAA, of Bandon, Oregon, is the late Tuesday night 75 meter NCS and the late Wednesday night 40 meter NCS.

He has been active on the 3905 CCN for about three years and says he has enjoyed every night of it.

"I have collected several awards and am in the process of completing the 1K on both 75 and 40 meters," Pete said. He already has both 500 pts certificates and is just one DX contact away from the 40 Meter Journeyman

award and four contacts from the 100 RTTY award.

Pete has also been the Seventh Area awards manager for two years.

"My ham history started when I was in Guam in the Coast Guard, I held a novice license but let it expire when I was in New York," Pete said. "Computers took all my extra money at that time and radio was dropped."

Pete became an active as ham again in 2004 and now have an extra class license.

Pete runs a Yaesu FT-1000MP into an Ameritron AL-80A and feeds it to a bazooka sloper on 40 meters. He has a 75 meter wire inverted V that is 40 feet at its apex.

N5OHL Qualifies for #35 'Found the Elephant Award'

Walter P. "Page" Pyne, WA3EOP, introduced the "Found the Elephants Award" several years ago and is presently issuing a 8-1/2 x 11 inch photo-quality certificate to anyone who has QSL's to confirm they have worked the station in six different states. Back in the mid-1960s, Page was WN3EOP-- when he added an "A" he became phonetically known as "We Are Three Elephants on Patrol."

Early in his ham life, when Page was looking for cute phonetics for WA3EOP he settled on We Are 3 Elephants On Patrol; and it stuck when his son, who was in elementary school he decided to draw three Elephants on Patrol and for years his drawing graced Page's qsl cards. When he got older and a better artist, he redrew the elephants and that was on another QSL cards series.

A couple years back KZ3AB and WA3EOP drove south and operated in Tennessee, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, the Richmond, Va., Charleston, W.V. That trip helped several stations earn their Found the Elephants award. Like my QSLs, that design has improved to the fixed design he uses today.

"While in Richmond, Al, KZ3AB, and me met "Hanna" the Middle School daughter of a nurse I had met by phone during an insur-

ance benefit program," Page explained. Hanna learned from her mother I was coming to town and liked the Three Elephants and wanted to see an amateur radio station.

"She dropped by our mobile, got a demonstration at a Century Club Net and presented my with an Elephant she had crafted out of clay. That elephant is in the

Pocket Rocket mobile and Patrols with me on my Pocket Rocket Adventures."

Page's son and daughter bought him a handmade cane with an elephant head.

"That is also in the car," Page said. "So with, the cane, the clay elephant and me, We Are 3 Elephants on Patrol.

His most recent QSLs

have featured the Pocket Rocket Mobile and except for the award, the elephants take a back seat.

"That will change soon," Page said. "New QSLs are being made and I think Century Club members who receive them will be believers that the elephants are back in a big way. Until then I use my "Happy QSLs" which picture both me when I was leading an All Girl Ham Band at a Christmas Party and the Pocket Rocket at a Hilltop."

When Page posted details about the award on the Century Club's email list, a number of members responded that they had the award. Page lost track of who received which number and would appreciate hearing from anyone who has received an award.

YL on 40 meters and all state capitals.

Much of Page's mobile operation has been on Century Club nets. It makes sense, therefore, that most award-holders are active Century Club members. He operates barefoot, 50 watts using an Outbacker antenna.

"There are no band, mode or time restrictions to worry about," Page explains. "What makes this award a challenge is there is only one station needed. Unlike a baker's dozen, where there are many truckers and a few leisure drivers piling up states regularly, winning this award requires luck, skill and propagation."

Page generally drifts between four regular states. Most years she will also add Delaware one night on the air.

"So getting six or more depends on being around on those rarer times when I venture elsewhere," Page said. "Ron Kaufman, N9KNJ says he has me in 11 states; and Pete Summers, N2XTT has me in nine, and they of course have "found the elephants" and gotten their awards."

Page said recently award winners have been Bill Grow, WA3SYR, Richard Smale, W5IL, Howard Johnson, WA5AUR, and Paul Kelly, NN5G and Jimmy Richardson, N5OHL qualified.

"N5OHL will be getting Certificate #35 so its still kind of rare," Page said.

In July, Page will head up for a few days and will operate mobile with Allen Brown, KZ3AB. They



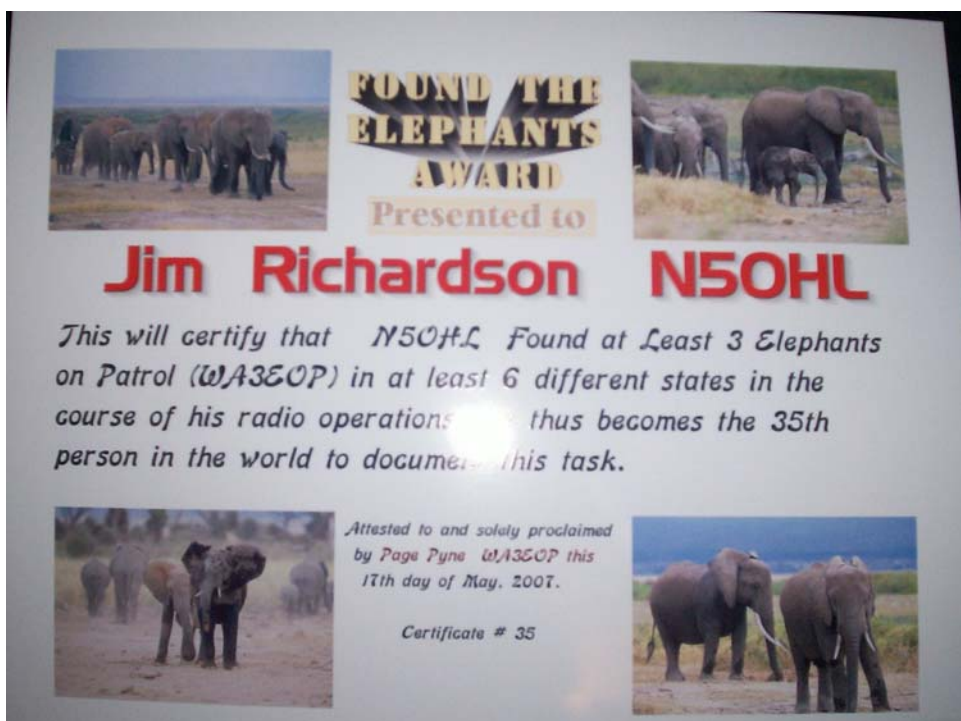
