In 2000, after a 40 year abstinence, I decided to get back into radio. At the time, it was at the top of the sunspot cycle. It was fun working DX, but as DX waned, I spent less time on the radio. In 2003 I had a mediocre Quail season and got back on the radio. I never had received a reward, so decided a 40 meter WAS would be fun pursuing as I had never spent time on this band. I did an internet search to find out about WAS nets. I worked 115 contacts on the 3905 and OleMiss nets, finished the ARRL WAS, and put the radio up.

In March, 2005 Quail season was over, so I decided to pursue other bands WAS. Due to poor higher frequency propagation, I started participating regularly on 3905 40 meter nets. A few months later I heard N1NU mention Husker football and that caught my ear as I am an avid OU fan. We traded a few emails and Jim mentioned he was using the Masters applica-

tion as a check list to simply set goals for working nets. That made sense to me, so I started doing the same. I didn't see any point in aimlessly making calls on a net without at least a few goals in mind. I got my first 100 point number in July, 2005 and the Masters in February, 2007


Time went by and I was helped by many others on the nets, with N5OHL, K0HNM and WB5FDP, being 3 of many. KD4POJ graciously finished up both DX app's for me while he was in Greenland. One thing that impressed me about 3905 was the number of people willing to help you. Also, the general relay help on all of the nets is invaluable, so it is also good for you to help with relays.

Until July, 2006 I greatly benefited on DX from others working on their Masters Award who were bringing DX on the nets. That was great for a while, then finally it was my job to get DX. N1NU and I worked together to get not only DX on, but others like YL's and Capitals. I also spent many late 75 meter net nights with N0PUI getting New Zealand and Australia on the nets to finish his Masters and obviously help my cause. "Trolling" for DX in the DX portion of bands and direct emailing can be very effective.

Advice in getting awards....(1) Make as many nets as you can and don't forget the late nets. For the time spent the late nets yielded more contacts than the other nets, (2) Never pass up DX, (3) Never pass up mobiles, (4) Be a NCS.... timely extra calls are a real bonus, (5) Send QSL cards within 3 days of contact, (6) be patient (the hardest thing for me).

In working for awards, I found a good logging program to be a real time saver and effective in helping me determine who to work on a net. When I would get close to finishing an award I would download the application and manually start filling it in to see what my needs were. Paying attention during checkins and during the net will also tell you who you can hear and possibly work.

First President of the 3905 Century Club Howie Gould W9HG SK

Born in South Boston in 1931, I always had a fascination for radio from the time I was able to walk and talk. My folks had an old radio that sat on a table in the living room that we listened to every evening that had an open type back of the cabinet exposing the tubes and their signal grid leads and the tubes had a orange glow and a slight feeling of heat coming off them that attracted me to investigate and poke fingers at. I remember one time putting my finger on a lead to one of the tube grid caps and the station we were listening to blasted in, that was my first contact with radio and I have been at it ever since.

I remember another embarrassing moment in time when I was in High School and had purchased my first what they called a 2-way portable radio that used A and B batteries and also plugged into A/C. Having no money to purchase new batteries when the battery voltage dropped I decided to charge the batteries by way of 120V A/C, that was my first encounter with DC and AC voltages which resulted in a smoking radio and it was then I decided to learn about electricity and Ohm's law and this eventually led to Ham Radio and an electronics career with a commercial radio and TV manufacturer. Being a tinkerer at heart Ham Radio became a natural for me and stepped me into many wiring and building projects through the ensuing years that followed me into the early days of analog circuits.

I have been involved with public service, handling of phone patches in the sixties from the Antarctica for our military guys and gals, founded The 3905 Century Club (Feb 1977) and was one of the first officers for ECARS. I also am a member of the A1 Operator Club. I served my country during the Korean War as a Marine and I serve now as a MARS Air Force operator with the call sign AFA2JI.

I especially enjoy making wire antennas of all sorts and talking on both phone and CW. I have some digital interests but being as I am from the old school of analog circuitry and hand wired radios where you could actually find the exact one part that was defective versus changing out a block of components contained in today's digital chips which hold a ton of components and circuitry, I am thoroughly satisfied with good old radio. Ham Radio has been a good hobby for me as it has given me a chance to meet many people from all walks of life and sometimes be able to meet and help those along the way who are stumbling through their early phase of learning the radio art.

I was first licensed as a Novice class in 1955 and I have held the calls KN1HHN, K1HHN, W4NVF, and my present call W9HG so as to personalize and associate it with my name. I also passed the Extra in 1993 doing a blazing 20 wpm solid copy on the full text, a skill I am deeply proud of since it is only a memory of a skill to be cherished now that they have dropped the Morse code for an open road to an unearned Extra Class and I still don't get it. I am a certified VE heading a group that has been active since 1993, and I thoroughly enjoy watching new faces come into the hobby and become part of our fraternity especially those who earned it.

Ham radio is entering a new and exciting era and I look forward to the new digital world that is being created which will renew interest in this old hobby of ours.

My operating is principally with of a FT-1000 Mark V and a K2, and I generally run about 250-300 watts from an AL-811. I live in OKC on a 1/2 acre lot and have antenna restrictions, so I have used an 80 meter loop at 35' and a 40 meter V for most 3905 work. For 160 I ran 90' extensions on each leg of the 40 meter V along the top of a stockade fence at 5' to make the antenna resonant. It is deemed a "horizontal U". I laughed too, but it worked well enough for the 100 point card and a WAS, so it proved almost anybody can get on 160.

My operating is principally with of a FT-1000 Mark V and a K2, and I generally run about 400-500 watts. The most challenging part of going for awards on 3905 for me was being patient in waiting for cards and expecting ALL others to responsibly send cards. Seems like there is just a small percentage that will not properly respond for some inexplicable reason. I bet these people don't pay their bills on time either. Some folks are just like that. I finally decided if I couldn't enjoy the 3905 experience that I should probably go do something else.

Working with others on the nets makes the whole process both more fun and productive. Also, I have enjoyed the many friendships I have made through 3905...73 Paul, NN5G

Eyeball 2008—Aug 1,2,3 Hanover, PA Hosted by Bill Dobson, N3WD

The 2008 Century Club eveball will be held just south of Hanover, PA in Pleasant Hill, PA at the Pleasant Hill Volunteer Fire Company social hall and carnival grounds. The cost will be \$30 for adults and \$15 for children 12 and under. The official web page for the eyeball is at www.n3wd.org. I will keep it up to date.

The social hall is air conditioned and wheel chair accessible. The Saturday evening dinner will be provided by the fire company's ladies auxiliary. They will be serving from the kitchen and the hall is big enough to hold presidents and celebria couple hundred folks.

There will be camping and RV accessibility on the carnival grounds. ALL RV hook ups will have electric and some will have water. The fire company will be collecting a fee to hook up of \$25 the first night and \$20 each night after. As of this time we will have space available for folks to pitch a tent if they wish. A bathroom is available, but NO shower facilities exists at this time. I am working with the fire hall to see if the showers in the actual fire hall can be made available during certain times.

Hotels will be at a premium since Hanover is the overflow for Gettysburg. Book early for rooms. I have worked with 5 hotels/motels for accommodations and have listed many more on my web page.

This years eyeball site is only 1.4 miles from the Maryland/Pennsylvania state line. There is a shoulder on both sides that about 5 vehicles could pull off on each

side. The QRP nets should be more than able to work folks on the state line. Also, the Pennsylvania state capital of Harrisburg is less than an hour away.

There are plenty of things for folks to do before or after the eyeball. Gettysburg is just 20 minutes away for those who are history buffs. The National Shrine Grotto of Ladv of Lourdes is about 40 minutes away. If you visit the Grotto you really need to stop and have lunch at the Cozy Inn in Thurmont, MD. This little Inn has seen many ties over the years because of it's proximity to Camp David.

Antietam Nation Battlefield, Hershey Park, PA Dutch Country, Baltimore and Washington, DC are close by. Also, for those football fans the Baltimore Ravens training camp is less that 20 minutes from the eyeball site in Westminster. MD.

If you have never been to the Mid-Atlantic area I really suggest making it a vacation and spend a few extra days in the area.

As of this time we are frantically working on getting some really nice door prizes for this years event. I am fortunate to be the treasurer of the Baltimore ARC and we hold a hamfest in late March. I am working on some deals with some of our vendors for door prizes. The more folks that sign up early the better the prizes. There will also be a special prize drawing for those that sign up by April 1.

As of right now we will

have a Ten-Tec Paragon Sunday—8AM Breakfast and a Ten-Tec Jupiter as the operating stations with an Ameritron AL-811 amp and a second amp which is tbd. The antennas at this time will be a vertical for 40 on top of a 40 foot mobile tower. The 80 meter station will have a Carolina Window for now. Don't be surprised if the 80 meter station is moved outside and we us a 132 foot vertical long wire raise by a weather balloon. The Hanover Area Hamming Association holds field day there and this antenna has been gang busters.

For the year of 2007 a total of 1456 points were awarded I would also ask that each of you (especially our top ten NCS) take time to recap what you tried that you feel has improved net operations.

> I personally tried a couple of things this year that seems to have been well accepted.

1. I usually give the people that stick around for the whole net a chance to make "as many calls as they need" on the last round. No one leaves until they have worked everyone that they need, or until we run out of time. I find that a few more have stayed instead of disappearing after round one has finished.

2. Make sure the stations that pop up as "direct" are welcomed to the net and that they have the website information so they can learn about the bureau. Also make sure they get a courtesy envelope after 5 stations have contacted them. Most of these people have returned to the net.

3. Tried to have an upbeat attitude and hopefully that came across in my voice. A pleasurable net holds their attention.

I will end this with another great "Thank you" to all that have contributed and made the job of Net Coordinator an easy task. Having a full calendar each month is much less stressful, and we are beginning to attract new stations to act as NCS.
