


to hear. I posted a short note to the reflectors and there are many of you that share the same feeling. My short December message to our members is to put Rick into their prayers especially during the holiday season.

Carolina Amigos At Congaree National Park

eff K4JEL and John KL7JR, aka the "amigo grey beards", like Willie Nelson are playing "on the road again"! Jeff pulled into my driveway on November 11. We loaded his gear and set out for Congaree National Park near Columbia, SC. The park is a 90-minute drive from my QTH and is primitive camping only- no RV's. Bringing a tent and sleeping on the ground no longer appeals to me, hi hi! No problem, we will park the R/V Icemobile IV at the boat ramp on the SE boundary of the park. We hope to bring some bling on this trip including, mobile and portable SSB on all nets including 20m on Saturday and 160m on Friday and Saturday. I'm sure Jeff will be chomping at the bit to do POTA as well! Don't tell anyone but I think Jeff also has National Parkitis!

ABOUT CONGAREE NATIONAL PARK

Established as a national park in 2003, Congaree is a primal forest on the river of the

same name. The park is situated about 20 miles southeast of Columbia Airport in central South Carolina and contains some of the tallest trees in the eastern United States. Park visitors can follow a canoe trail down Cedar Creek, the preferred exploration method in Congaree.

However, travelers should be aware that they must bring their own canoe or kayak, as the park does not rent or provide them.

Astonishing biodiversity exists in Congaree National Park, the largest intact expanse of old growth bottomland hard-

wood forest remaining in the southeastern United States. Waters from the Congaree and Wateree Rivers sweep through the floodplain, carrying nutrients and sediments that nourish and rejuvenate this ecosystem and support the growth of national and state champion trees.

OUR GEAR

Our antenna arsenal will include my 40 and 75m MFJ Hamsticks (plus spares), my 60-year-old Webster Bandspanner 10-80m vertical and a Nelson 10-80m EFHW wire I modified to work on 160m.

My TS-590SG transceiver and LDG Z-100+ tuner will do all the work for us. There aren't many options for installing antennas on the Icemobile IV since more than 50% of the vehicle is fiberglass. A tilt up mast off the hitch works the best.

LET'S GET STARTED

3905 20m Veterans Day Friday net saw K4JEL/p SC with WE4FUN/p SC and KL7JR/p SC with K7ICE/p SC camped under Highway 601 at Bates Bridge Landing at the south east boundary of Congaree National Park. With a pair of high voltage power lines par-

alleling the highway and a large concrete bridge overhead, this was the best place we could find for what we had planned. Yes, we were camped under a huge concrete bridge that spanned the Congaree River in Congaree National Park.

My 160m EFHW easily tuned 20m with only the apex at 20 feet in an inverted L configuration sloping to 10 feet above the concrete parking lot. K9DBB, Al4K, K9LCY, N5MNO, K5GEB, K7QHU, KM4P and a few others made our log. On 40m early net we worked KI4WCQ/m MO,

K9DBB, AI4K, W6PNY, W8NET, N0PMQ, W8JCS, KE8RRG, W2RCH and a few others all

with strong signals. Later the EFHW would only tune 40m much to my surprise. It had always done all the HF bands before. Even when tested earlier. The on and off rain may have been the problem. On the 75m early net I had my 60-year-old Webster Bandspanner vertical mast mounted to the hitch of Icemobile IV. This antenna was very popular in the early 1960s. It was the original mechanical screwdriver antenna. N5KUC, N5WGA, KQ4CIA, AI4K, K9DBB, K9GWS, KD4GUB/m AR, KU1V, W4CPO and a few

others found their way in our log! Over the last 20 years I've made several thousand

contacts from Alaska and the Yukon using this gem! The Gentlemen's Band (160m) was not kind to us. Antenna now was a 130 foot long Inverted L for 160m. With the apex at 20 feet high we worked W0JKT/p GA, K9GWS and a couple others.

The antenna was receiving far better than transmitting. Maybe it was the rain or proximity to the concrete bridge, or both (?). I had always had good luck using inverted L type aerials. Not today.

On the 75m late net with my old Bandspanner, KB1XP, K9DBB, Al4K, K9GUB (now mobile MS), AA0HF and KJ6EEP with a few others for good measure gave us a work out. Taking several spare aerials was a good idea! The next day on the 20m Saturday net conditions were much better. WG0I, Al4K, K9DBB, K5GEB (the Voice of Louisiana!), VE3CMB (Trudeau's

Trumpeter!) and others easily made our logbook. The outdoor temperature must have been around 70 degrees with sporadic rain and the parking lot was starting to fill up with fishermen launching their boats as we pulled the plug for home. Although we had some antenna issues and rain to deal with, it was another fun trip for the amigos!

160m "T Vertical"



very once in awhile I play with an antenna that turns out to be a real winner. Somewhere I read that a T vertical is a bit better than an Inverted L. I like Inverted L's

and pretty much know what they can do. This "T" part I thought was strange yet though is still in the bent vertical family as the Inverted L is.

My apex is about 30 feet high and the vertical radiator slopes down to the feed point to fit the space intended. I added 4 ground radials at about 20-30 feet long (length not all that critical) and drove a 3-foot-long section of steel pipe as a ground rod. No balun required but an air choke may keep any stray RF from entering your shack. SWR was 1.3 right off the bat and that works for me.

I was amazed on how well it performed on 160, 40 and 20. It did not like 75m but easily tuned 10,12 and 17m as well! Next I'll build a T vertical for 75m (3 legs at 20 ft each) and see how flexible it is.


