ith a new year there are new opportunities and our club never has a shortage of opportunities. One that I would like to share with the club is how we are going to rebuild the DX QSL Bureau.

Shortly after the passage of WB5FDP I was contacted by his son, who offered to help us with the transition. it was at this point that I had a meeting with several board members and approached Dave (AI4K) and

Debbie (K9DBB) who offered to take on the DX QSL Bureau duties. After several meetings and calls we put together an informal plan of how it might happen. Then came the holidays and we decided to put it off until this month.

At a very high level the current activities include 1) updating the website with an overview on how the new DX bureau will function including procedures on how to use the bureau; 2) getting connected and taking a trip to Little Rock to retrieve that materials that Rick had collected (this will include the cash slush fund, envelopes, etc); 3) the final plan for reopening the bureau. Our soft target date is February but this could change a bit. In the mean while you can start sending your DX cards to Debbie & Dave at the following address: Dave Yarbrough, 92 Elizabeth Dr, Atoka, TN 38004. I have also instructed our NCS stations to continue recording DX contacts on all nets and sending them to Dave at this email address: <u>dxbureau@3905ccn.org</u>. These logs will become vital for creating Century Club Courtesy cards.

As with every January, it is time to VOTE! Voting this year is for directors that live in odd call areas (1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and DX) and the Vice President. Voting is easy: 1) log into the clubs website; 2) Under the top menu Club Information select Elections, then Vote Online; 3) after that the voting system will help you vote. It takes less than 30 seconds to login and vote. The bad news about voting is that you WILL NOT get a nice sticker or button that tells everyone you voted.

And finally my personal goal for 2023 is to get more new masters. During the past 5 years we have only had 3 new masters. It seems like the contacts that are needed are Alaska, Hawaii, and 75m DX, pretty much what I call if getting contacts that are at least 5,000 miles away.

And with this I wish everyone a happy and safe new year.

A Feel Good Story

ecember 21, 2022 I was home in South Dakota. The weather is cold and nasty with a blizzard on the way, so I decided to read the Dec/Jan issue of the AARP magazine. I read the magazine page by page until I got to the article by Dale Sanders who paddled down the mighty Mississippi river, from start to finish. Ending up at the gulf. And he did it twice. A good article. I call it a feel good story.

Well I am a curious guy and wondered where is the start of the mighty river. So I go to the computer, find google maps and trace back to the start of the Mississippi. It goes north of Minneapolis up thru St. Cloud, Grand Rapids, then west to Bemidji MN. It then goes a little south to the headwaters of the Mississippi. A place called the Itasca State Park, MN.

While looking at the map I saw a link to a live web cam. I pulled up the web cam and saw the headwaters. Its a snow covered lake and you could see running water starting its journey downstream. I was admiring the winter landscape and something caught my eye. I thought I saw something move out in the frozen lake. Daylight was slowly fading and I wondered what is that moving in the lake. Then I saw it again and figured out it was a deer that fell through the ice and wasn't able to get out of the icy water. It would try to get out and slip back into the water. The outcome did not look good and I am probably the only person in the world watching this.

He paused and said he would pass it on to the park people. I hang up and watch the live feed from the web cam. Will anyone come to help that deer or will things go downhill?

Daylight is now fading fast and its starting to snow. I see the deer try a few more times to escape the water but each time it slips back into the water. All I can do is watch and hope. After 20 minutes or so I saw some headlights light up the area. It was a hum vee with four park employees in it. They were all bundled up and had lights. They saw the deer right away. Two of them circled around through the woods to get closer to the deer. I could not see what was going on. But found out later they had some rope and lassoed the deer and were able to pull it out of the water and to safety. I can only guess that the deer is ok and running around somewhere in Minnesota.

Life is strange sometimes, the way things work out. Good job to the Itasca state park employees. They went out in cold temps late in the day to save that deer. Thanks to the AARP and to Dale Sanders. And that's my feel good story !!

Below is the latest update on Yukon John's planned trip for this spring. It looks like it is shaping up to be another epic journey for John! Stay tuned for updates as spring approaches.


GOT KL7, VY1 and VE8???

First-Class USPS Stamp Prices Will Increase in January 2023

The United States Post Office (USPS) recently announced upcoming postage rate increases that will happen in the new year. If you send First-Class mail, like letters and postcards, even occasionally, you'll want to know what to expect so your mail makes it to its destination.

According to USPS, these increases will help combat rising operational costs. The most recent First-Class mail price increase happened on July 10, 2022. Soon, prices will rise again.

Price increases range from \$0.03 to \$0.05, depending on the product. The price increases will begin on Jan. 22, 2023.

KL7JR HUSTLER 4BTV 12 AND 17 METER MODIFICATION

Hustler 4BTV on 12 and 17 Meters Plus 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters! 6 Bands on the 4BTV! by John Reisenauer, KL7JR

It is easy to convert some commercially made verticals to work on the WARC bands. I sometimes take my 4BTV on portable outings but miss not getting to work the WARC bands. Not anymore!



Finished "mod" showing 12 and 17 Meter add on verticals

For my mod, I used scrap 1/2 inch plastic electrical conduit to support the vertical wires (the white PVC pipe or other non-conductive material also works), 2 lengths at


2 foot long each, some #14 wire, (see lengths below), a handful of cable tie-raps, something non-conductive for insulators, (I used scrap plastic tubing), and a 1-1/2 inch hose clamp and some string to tie the insulators to the plastic supports. See additional pictures below:



Connect both vertical wires and the center conductor of your coax feed line with a hose clamp (for my portable use I used battery clamps to attach the coax) at the base of the commercially made vertical antenna. Even though some commercially made verticals can be used "stake mounted" without ground radials, I put down ground radials and tie to coax shield whenever I can. For a more permanent mounting, I'd use bolt on connectors over the battery clamps.

The formula for cutting the wire length is the old standby:

234 / Freq mhz = length in feet.

I used 13 feet for 17 meters and 9 feet 5 inches for 12 meters.

If you're a perfectionist you may have to tune and prune your lengths for best performance!

My Z-100 tuner and TS-50 transceiver easily tuned both wires! In a few hours of operating on my first test outing (fair band conditions) I worked Canada and Mexico plus about a dozen states on each band.

It's amazing what you can do with a piece of wire and a little time.
