Daylight Saving Time Ends on Sunday, November 5,2023.

On Saturday night, clocks are set back 1 hour (i.e., gaining one hour) to "fall back." Sunrise and sunset will be about 1 hour earlier on Nov 5, 2023, than the day before. There will be more light in the morning. Most, if not all, of our nets will retain their Zulu start times. This re-



sults in the local start time of our nets being one hour earlier. Keep an eye on the club email reflectors for notices about any exceptions.

3905 Century Club Election 2024

Election 2024 is for President and Area Directors in even-numbered call areas.

Nominations for President open November 1, 2023 UTC (Zulu) and close December 20, 2023. Nominations for President may be made to your Area Director who will submit these nominations at any Board of Directors meeting during the Nomination Period. All club members may vote for President, regardless of their Call Area.

Nominations for Area Directors in even-numbered call Areas may be made by the nominee on any 3905 Century Club net and the Nominee must notify the Election Monitors, the President and the Chairman of the Board of Directors. After that, the Nominee will be placed on the ballot found on the club website. Only club members in the Call Area may vote for candidates of their Call Area.

Nominees may provide a picture and biography that will appear on the club website. Nominees are encouraged to also provide a statement of their vision and goals for the club in the capacity of the office they are running for.

Voting begins January 1, 2024 UTC (zulu). A Club member's ballot may be cast in one of four ways:

- 1. Vote on-line on the club website
- 2. Vote by email
- 3. Vote by USPS mail
- 4. Vote on the Air

Instructions for voting by any one of these four methods can be found on the club website www.3905ccn.org. Log in, choose 'Club Info' then select 'Elections' then select 'Election Info'.

One new change is that there will be an opportunity to vote on the air on a 40M SSB net or a 75M SSB net. These will be on the last day of the voting period, January 15 UTC (zulu). Details will be on the 'Election Info' page.

Please take some time for consideration and participation by service to the club as a candidate and also by voting in the Election. This is a fantastic way to have input and support our club!

BEN'S COLUMN

Notes from the Awards Secretary

In this month's column, I cover three topics. First, I provide an update on our new Master's plaque program.

Next, using a distant echo by a still-prominent club member, we look at the ins and outs of the 1000-point award. Finally, I reveal a new award possibility that the Awards Committee will ask the Board to approve. So, let us begin.

Master's Plaque Program

Last month, I introduced our redesigned Master's Plaque, along with a program that would enable existing Masters to obtain the plaque at less than half the club's cost. The price we set was \$40, which was good for thirty days, a period that will have expired at the time you read this. After October 30, the price for existing Masters will increase to \$80, still a bit less than the club cost. Of course, newly approved Masters will receive their personalized plaques free of charge, as a benefit of their achievement.

The program has been a resounding success! We have twelve orders in various stages as of this date (late October). Eight have already been shipped, and we have received some very positive feedback regarding the beauty of the plaque from several Masters who have received theirs.

Although it is too late to take advantage of the special promotional price, existing Masters can still order a plaque for \$80 at the <u>Club website</u>. This ongoing offer has no expiration date.

The 1000-Point Award

The following was published in the Centurion on October 1, 2001. Most of it is still relevant today. Its author is Jimmy Richardson, N5OHL, (pictured below), who was the Fifth Area Awards Manager from 1997 to 2018 and who hosted the 2007 Eyeball. I personally benefitted from Jim's wisdom and advice as I was growing up as a 3905 Century Club member. Now, over twenty years have passed since Jim wrote this article, but it remains an excellent introduction to the 1000-Point Award.

Without a doubt one of the most popular awards is the 1000-point award. This is the first of the really tough progressive awards and it is like working all states five times over using different stations. Alaska and Hawaii are the exceptions, because only one contact from these states is needed.

The major portion of this award is the "Prefix" page with five blanks next to the 48 states. Here you must not only work five different stations, but they must all have different prefixes. Some folks get a copy of the 1000-point award and fail to read the rules. You can easily slip up on this one.

Do not just start filling in the blanks. Read the rules. A prefix as stated in the club's bylaws is whatever is to the left of the number in the call sign. For example, KB5GVR, KB1VU, KB3GN/m, and KB0W all have the same prefix, which is only the letters "KB". Likewise, N2XTT, N0SD, N5UJB, and N1ZT all have the same prefix, which is only the letter "N".

The number is not part of the prefix. Nowadays with so many vanity calls in existence, getting five different prefixes is much easier than it used to be. But do be careful in this area of the award and double check your application before sending it in to your area awards manager.

The other portions of the award include a mobile area where you must work any ten mobiles. And last is the DX area. You must work fifteen DX stations from at least five different countries. Remember when I told you to save those DX contacts?

One of the most often asked questions is about how to use the "wildcards". For the 1000-point award, a "wildcard" is a contact made with a person that has already earned the 1000-point award. Their 1000-point certificate number must be on the card to be valid for use as a "wildcard". [For higher level progressive awards, a wildcard is defined as someone who has earned the next-lower 1000-point level. —ae4nt]



For example, my 1000-point certificate number on 40-meters SSB is number 257. You may use up to four wildcards but only one per state and they may not be used in the mobiles or DX areas. You cannot use a "wildcard" on the 100-point or the 500-point awards (or the equivalent Level I or Level II on higher progressive awards.)

Now what do we do about the "Super Wildcard"? This is a holder of the Master's Degree Award. The Super Wildcard can be used as an additional wild card. It can only be used on awards that already use wildcards. Right now, we have only eight Masters, so I suggest you use these only when you really need one. [That was then, and this is now. Twenty-two years later, we have seventy-five Masters! –ae4nt]

On the 1000-point and higher progressive series awards, the Super Wildcard can only be used in the state prefix area like a normal wildcard. A wildcard and a super wildcard can be used in the same state. Only one Super Wildcard per award application, and once it is used it may never be used again. I suggest you work every Masters Degree holder. Save at least one for use on the Poker Players award. As usual, the number must be on the card for it to be valid.

After you achieve the 1000-point, you may continue with the progressive series. The 2000-point and higher awards are just like working the 100, 500, and 1000 all over again. The same rules apply but you must use all new contacts.

Way out in front on 40 meters is Ricardo K8MZA with the unbelievable achievement of the 24,000-point award! On 75 meters KA1IFC, WY8V, and WB2RWT hold the top place at the 11,000-point level. Believe it or not, on 160 meters there have been seven 1000-point certificates earned. On the other nets such as CW, RTTY and PSK-31 no one has earned the 1000-point yet. [This paragraph, of course, is outdated, but I include it for completeness and for history's sake. For those of you who are curious about how we have progressed since 2001, I give the current standings below.—ae4nt]

Have fun working on your awards.

Jim N5OHL

Jim continues to be a prominent Club member as a member of both the Awards Committee and the Presidential Advisory Committee. He is Master #17 and Old-Timer #1. He holds a 17,000-Point Award on 40M SSB and a 12,000-Point Award on 75M SSB.

As I promised, here are the current progressive leaders:

40M SSB: N2XTT 46,000 75M SSB: N2XTT 22,000

160M SSB: AE1Q, KM5MS, and WT0A 4,000

40M CW: KK2M 1,000

Many band/mode combinations have not yet seen the 1000-point level reached. You can make your mark on Club history if you attain that level on one of them!

Potential New Award Forthcoming

Back in 2021, the Awards Committee created the Old-Timers program to recognize Club members in good standing with at least thirty years of membership. In addition to providing a free certificate and an Old-Timer number, the designation was foreseen for its potential in creating future awards based on contacts with Old-Timers, and to keep the Pick 30 Award viable by allowing substitution of an Old-Timer for an Original Charter Signer.

Now that we have a good base of Old-Timers – currently 41 – we have reached the point where both of those needs can be realized. Fourth Area Awards Manager and Master #52 Johnny Allen, KI4WCQ, provided the impetus to move the Committee forward by proposing the "Auld Lang Syne Award", which will reward members who contact twenty -five Old-Timers. It will be endorsable in increments of fifteen additional Old-Timers.

This will not be a slam-dunk where you just fill out an application with existing contacts. We will establish a start date for contacts, which will coincide with the effective date of the new award. So, you will need to make new contacts with Old-Timers to obtain the award.

In the same motion we will send to the Board, we will ask that the Pick 30 Award be amended to include an Old-Timer as an equivalent to an Original Charter Signer. This move should make this award more easily attainable, as we have only one remaining OCS who is sporadically active on the nets.

More details will be forthcoming after the motion is approved by the Board of Directors. We anticipate implementation by the beginning of 2024 if all goes well.

160m SSB NET NEWS

160m SSB Nets Start November 12th Zulu

160 SSB Nets Coordinator

The 160m Net is the oldest Ham Band. It is sometimes called the Top Band or the Gentlemen's Band. If you listen to some of the QSO's on 160m you might wonder why it's call the Gentlemen's Band.

160m is one of the most challenging bands to operate on efficiently. The size of the antenna almost always requires the use of a compromise antenna. A half wave dipole is 253 feet long and for the antenna to work well it needs to be 125 feet in the air. This is beyond what most ham's can do.

Why would anyone want to operate on 160m? For anyone wanting to get his or her Masters degree it's required. As ham's we also like a challenge.

So what do I do? Wire in the air won't help you as much as wire on the ground. Verticals rule on 160m for distant contacts. It does not need to be a "real" vertical as long as the antenna radiates vertically. An inverted "L" works. That's what I use. An inverted "V" or helical wound antenna also radiate vertically. Below are a few links on antenna that you can build. They might give you a few ideas to start with.

80m CW Net Changes

With the coming of the Daylight Saving time change, there will be some changes to the CW nets. Starting in November, the following changes will be implemented:

The Saturday (Z) 02:00z 80m Early CW Net is moving to Friday (Z) 02:00z.

The Monday (Z) 04:00z 80m Late CW Net is moving to Sunday (Z) and the time has changed from 04:00z to 05:00z.

20m CW Trial Net Addition

Over the past several months, I have noticed that the 20m band is usually open (longish) in the morning (at least on the East Coast) and then seems to shorten in the afternoon. I used the <u>International Beacon Project Transmission Schedule (ncdxf.org)</u> to help confirm what I was observing. I thought that a Saturday morning 20m Early CW Net might give our members who operate 20m CW a chance to make some new contacts. Thus, for the month of November, there will be the following 20m CW Net scheduled:

Saturday (Z) Morning CW Net starting at 13:00z.

If this results in additional check-ins, especially DX check-ins, then this could be made a permanent addition to our net schedules. I would appreciate any feedback!

We still need volunteer CW Net NCS's! Currently we only have 3 CW Net NCS's and we sure could use a few more!






Next morning, I headed for Olympic NP via route 101 and the park entrance near Port Angles, WA. This was a slow drive, but the reward was enjoyable landscape.




